43		<b>A</b> .	Lou Ward, County ACO gave the report to include 461 dispatch calls, 103
44			self-initiated calls, and 13 assist calls for a total of 577 calls for the month
45			of November. Reported stray calls were 197; picked up 31 stray cats and
46			64 stray dogs for a total of 95 stray animals. Additional animals picked up

that weren't stray were zero owner surrender cats, 14 owner surrender dogs, 19 sick or injured animals, six on a welfare hold, and six shelter quarantines. The field return to owner for November was 19 for a year to date of 347; a three year comparison was shown.

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- 6 Explanation of the GEO districts was shown for new attendees. There were 7 no strays in District 1, two cats and seven dogs in District 2, five cats and 8 16 dogs in District 3, five cats and 12 dogs in District 4, four cats and 18 dogs in District 5, four cats and two dogs in District 6, and six cats and nine 9 10 dogs in District 7. There were 10 exposure bites to humans, two exposure bites to animals, one rabies submissions which were negative, and three 11 from bite exposure were current on rabies vaccinations. There were five 12 13 guarantined at the Animal Services Center, one at the court hold facility, three were housed from a prior case, three home quarantines, and three 14 animals were gone on arrival. Owner release included six that were too 15 16 aggressive, three where the animals were too sick or dying and the owners couldn't afford veterinary care, four were being evicted and couldn't keep 17 the animal, and one transport for the Town of Mesilla that was involved with 18 19 crime. 20
- There were two court cases for November; only two charges. There were 13 hours of regular time and the outcome was one warrant and one guilty plea. One case was for rabies control and one was for restraint violation. SNAP reports from November included 57 dogs neutered, 41 cats neutered, 25 20 microchips, and 19 rabies vaccinations for a year to date total of 131 dogs, 96 cats, 112 microchips, and 103 rabies vaccinations.
- 28 Gino Jimenez, City ACO gave the report to include 414 stray animal calls; 29 238 were gone on arrival and 152 were apprehended. 146 were impounded 30 at the Animal Shelter; 65 dogs and 81 cats. There were 30 successful field returns with six unsuccessful, for a total of 36 identifiable stray animals. A 31 three year comparison of stray calls was shown; year to date is 4,653 calls 32 which is way below 2019 and 2018 numbers. The trend is attributed to the 33 COVID pandemic however they hope to continue the trend even after 34 35 normality resumes. A three year comparison of field return to owner was shown; the trend is still showing lower than previous years. The reasons 36 why they couldn't field return to owner included four that did not have 37 38 registered chips and two because there was no answer on the phone or 39 residence. 40
- 41Reasons for owner releasing animals included one dog acting aggressive42toward the owner, one medical emergency which was a euthanasia request43by the owner, and one owner admission of a dangerous dog. A map of the44districts was shown with indications of where the stray animal calls were45from; blue dots are dogs, orange dots are cats, and red dots are anything46other than dogs and cats. The map is available on the City of Las Cruces

web page. There was an unusually higher amount of animals in Councilor Abeyta-Stuve's district in November; there were 17 cats picked up from one residence.

A resident had been feeding stray cats and put bedding in a vehicle to provide warmth for the strays. An officer went out and spoke to the resident who stated they would get rid of the bedding and no longer feed the cats. When that resident stopped, another resident continued to feed the cats. The original resident that had asked for officers to speak to the initial resident has a homebound wife who has respiratory issues and the cat smell was making the symptoms worse so he asked for traps. During COVID the trap program has been stopped but they would pick up privately owned traps.

- 15 There was discussion on feral cats in the Mesquite Historic District. At one 16 point there was a cat colony that was cleared last year but there may be another resident doing it again. An officer has gone out and spoken to the 17 adult daughter of an elderly couple that were suspected of feeding the cats. 18 19 The numbers of cats will most likely be in the December numbers; there are 20 approximately 20 cats in the area. Currently there are no feral cat colony permits so they are not permitted within the City; six tried toward the end of 21 22 2019 but hit the deadline of the sunset clause and weren't permitted. Some people created colonies on their own even though they're not permitted and 23 that could be the issue in the historic district. The officer did educate the 24 25 residents and asked them to cease feeding the cats. There was discussion of the ordinance that is being written; they are currently asking for feedback 26 27 and the advisory committee are preparing presentations for City Council. There will need to be a lot of educational opportunities for the public if this 28 29 ordinance passes. 30
  - Gino Jimenez apologized that he was not present last month. He was unable to train someone to do the presentation due to being shorthanded but he has now shown Codes Supervisor Mike Roach how to do the presentation in case he must be absent again.
- 36 Β. Shelter Statistics/Activities: Clint Thacker gave the ASCMV Executive Director's report. The current animal count is 365; 253 dogs and 112 cats 37 38 which is down significantly from the same time last year which was 546. 39 The intake continues to be low due to the limitations from COVID. November had 321; 187 dogs and 129 cats. The lighter number allows staff 40 to better be able to care for the animals as well as social distancing with 41 less people coming in to the Center. There was one adoption return due to 42 behavior problems; they offered behavior trainings but the individuals 43 44 declined.
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1 November 2020 had 77 adoptions which was significantly lower from the previous year; 2019 had 265 adoptions. A possible reason is because of 2 3 the stay at home orders and issues with calling to get an appointment during 4 November. Reclaims totaled 16.8% which was higher than last year. 5 Rescues took 32% of the animals. Community Cats had 17 leave which 6 was 5%. Euthanasia was 18% which is lower than the previous year. These 7 resulted in a live release rate of 81.4%; 90% would qualify as a no kill 8 shelter. The number one reason for euthanasia in cats is feral; for dogs is 9 medical not including owner request. Until there is an ordinance in place to 10 combat it, feral cats will be the number one euthanasia reason. 11

- They are euthanizing skunks because of the nuisance to some people; the 12 13 people trap the skunks to take to the Center. The Department of Ag will not 14 allow them to release skunks back; reasons are if the skunk is sick they can infect the entire skunk population or if they release them all in one area that 15 16 can skew the population. There were mentions of good things skunks do. Currently they are looking into other options. If they didn't only accept sick 17 and injured animals currently then the live release rate would be 86.6%. 18 There were 19 animals euthanized that were sick or injured; they were 19 20 unable to go out to private veterinary for treatment.
- Total visitors in November was 306 which was lower than last year's due to the COVID restrictions; people must set an appointment and only two people can come in for that appointment. Total webpage views was 42,085 and Facebook views is 2,115. There was discussion on the monthly trends of views. Each webpage view is the clicks not necessarily a new person viewing the website. The pets of the week is Scabagail the cat and Lana the dog.

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- There was discussion about tracking percentages of those that come and 30 leave with adoption. Mr. Thacker will send the data to the Board. Mr. 31 Jimenez added that last year the Assistant City Manager Dollahon, Clint 32 Thacker, Mr. Jimenez, and members of the US Department of Agriculture 33 34 Wildlife Services met to discuss reducing the numbers of skunks taken to 35 the Service Center. They received a proposed MOU and it is in the final stages being signed at the state level. Once that happens the Wildlife 36 Services will respond to the skunk calls instead of Animal Control which will 37 38 keep them out of the Services Center. 39
- 40The MOU was signed by the Chief within the last couple weeks and is now41at the state level for final approval. Once it's sent back it will be enacted.42There was talk that they hope it'll be signed within the first quarter of the43year. There was a question of what the MOU will be with Wildlife Services.44Currently the City has an MOU in place with Wildlife Services that deals with45predatory animals. This MOU would add any nuisance wildlife to the current46one. Chair Flores requested to see a copy of the MOU. She added that

some of the definitions of nuisance or predatory wildlife are very broad and situational. There was comments about how some of the enforcements seem to be disturbing from stories from commission hearings. Ms. Ward added that the County's contract with Wildlife Services include a detailed quarterly report on the nuisance animals, the means of euthanasia if need be, and what the euthanasia was for, etcetera.

> There was a suggestion of sharing the reports with the Board that both the City and County receive from the Wildlife Services. The reports share the reports through the correct channels. Board Member Sanchez added that he has noticed the reports are lacking; it does not state the methods of euthanasia or how many had been tested for other diseases as required. He explained what the report shows and voiced his disappointment with it. Ms. Ward will send Board Member Sanchez her report for the County.

# C. Committee Reports

1. Finance - Tessa Abeyta-Stuve, Committee Chair: Board Member Abeyta-Stuve had a conflict; the original meeting time had to be changed due to holidays and it interfered with another City meeting of hers. Josh Saffell gave the financial report. The unaudited financials for November 2020 included General Fund cash of \$864,983.00 and receivables of \$4,855.00 for total assets of \$869,838.00. Liabilities total \$87,614.00 with revenues collected in advance of \$55,501.00; this left an unassigned fund balance of \$726,723.00. Capital projects Fund includes cash of \$29,798.00 and Restricted Fund balance of \$29,798.00. Capital Assets were net of accumulated depreciation of \$192,316.00.

Change in net position for all funds included General Fund total revenues at \$1,598,733.00 and total expenditures at \$1,043,758.00. The net change to fund balance was positive \$554, 975.00. The Capital Projects Fund had an expense of \$1,767.00. Capital Assets recognized depreciation of \$17,596.00. The budget to actual change in net position is 46.9% of budgeted revenue and 31% of budgeted expenditures. The budget parameter for this period was 41.67%. A line graph comparison of expenditures and revenues was shown; the expenditures were under the revenues until October but in November they almost match. Percentage of total expenditures included 79% personnel, 13% services, 5% supplies, and 3% insurance. Repairs, maintenance, and other costs were miniscule.

- 2. Executive Yvonne Flores, Committee Chair: There was no meeting this month.

3. Facilities - Kasandra Gandara, Committee Chair: There was no meeting this month. Mr. Thacker commented that the Center is doing well. There was a manager's meeting to discuss Shelter issues. Two more windows had to be added to the quote as there were more cracks and seals broken found. The quote for the floors to be waxed and sealed came back at roughly \$3,000.00. Due to quality control and how they want it done they have decided to go a different route; doing it themselves as they have the equipment. The opening of the bids for the new building will be happening in January. There were some amendments on the bid.

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There was discussion on who the replacement Ex-Officio Member will be now that Mr. Dollahon has retired. Eric Enriquez is an Assistant City Manager and will be filling that role. He introduced himself and gave his credentials; he used to work as a director of another animal services center.

D. CfPP Report: Jean Gilbert discussed 2 Hearts 4 Paws, ACTion Programs for Animals, Broken Promises Southwest, Cats' Meow Adoption Center, Cherished K-9 All Breed Rescue, Doña Ana County HS, and Humane Society of Southern NM. Additional information has been provided in the Board's packets.

The Coalition has participated as members of the Animal Care Task Force and the leadership recently gave input on the Animal Control Ordinance revisions to recommend an animal resource needs team be established by the City; to include participation of animal control, the Center director, animal agency representatives, animal advocates, and community members. The purpose would be to sustain what has been established with the Task Force to help reduce Shelter intake, expand resources, and support for animals who are victims. Additional reasons for the resource team were stated. The Coalition recently acknowledged David Dollahon's outstanding leadership of the Task Force and service on the ASCMV Board.

35 The highlighted agencies were discussed. 2 Hearts 4 Paws are located in Radium Springs and provide homes for older animals and strays. ACTion 36 Programs for Animals (APA) is offering half off their adoption fees for the 37 38 month of December. They are now at 537 North Solano which allows 39 expansion for boarding animals awaiting rescue. APA adjusted their pet 40 food hours to the second Sunday of the month from 2:00 pm to 4:00 pm with safe drive up distribution; average distribution of 10,000 pounds a 41 month of pet food and serve approximately 50 families a week. Pictures of 42 adopted pets were shown; pet sleepovers have an 80% success rate in 43 44 adoptions. APA adopted 161 animals and transferred 89 year to date; adoption rates were lower in November due to moving to the new location. 45 Broken Promises SW does rescue, foster, and TNR. Pictures of animals 46

they saved and have been adopted were shown. Adoptions year to date
are 40 cats; operating budget is more than \$40,000.00 needed to cover the
cost of the program and services.

Pictures of puppies at Cherished K-9's were shown; 16 of them were transported by I'm Almost Home Animal Rescue and Barkhouse to the Helen Woodward Animal Center in Southern California. Pictures of adopted dogs were shown. Cats' Meow year to date adoptions are 280; over 40 in November. Doña Ana County HS Pet for Seniors Program was mentioned. They hold virtual fundraisers as well as podcasts. The Humane Society of Southern NM has 13 animals in their foster care program with year to date adoptions of 20, with three adoptions recently. HSSNM operates the pet helpline with over 100 calls a month.

Motion to pass the resolution as amended by Board Member Sanchez, second by Board Member Gandara. Motion passed.
- 32 VII. **PUBLIC INPUT:** There were none received.

VIII. **CHAIR AND BOARD COMMENTS:** Chair Flores stated it has been a wonderful year being on the Board and she is impressed by the work of the Board and the Executive Director. She appreciates Curtis and Paul's two daily reports. Board Member Sanchez stated that the staff and Executive Director have done an amazing job keeping things running, making sure animals were cared for. Board Member Gandara thanks the staff and Executive Director and all they have done. Board Member Ellins stated Clint Thacker has done a marvelous job managing given the circumstances. Board Member Quintero wished everyone the best.

**Subject:** Animal Service Center of the Mesilla Valley Unaudited Financial Report for December 31, 2020.

Attached are the unaudited financial results of the Animal Service Center operations for the period ended December 31, 2020. Some observations for your consideration:

• The Statement of Net Position (page 1) reported cash of \$822,988 in the General Fund. Total assets were \$916,479. Accrued payroll liabilities ended at \$64,890. Total liabilities were \$120,391. The unassigned fund balance was \$796,088.

• The Capital Projects Fund reported restricted fund balance of \$29,798. \$28,000 is due to a transfer from the General Fund in fiscal year 2020; \$1,798 was the balance remaining for the Stern Cat Room Donation

• The Statement of Revenues and Expenditures (page 2) showed YTD operating revenues in the General Fund at \$1,831,918. YTD operating expenditures were \$1,207,578 with an operating income of \$624,340.

• The Statement of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balance – Budget to Actual (page 3) indicated 53.8% of budgeted revenues and 35.4% of budgeted expenditures had been recognized. The budget parameter for December was 50.0%.

• Insurance expense was at 57.1% of budget due to premiums being paid at the beginning of the fiscal year. All other expenditures, schedule pages 4 to 7, were below the budget parameter of 50.0%.

• The Grants and Donations Schedule, page 9, provides a summary of grants and donations received.
