10 11 12 13 14 15		L v a v s	City and County ACO Reports - City and County Animal Control: Mary Lou Ward from County ACO gave the report to include 346 reported strays of which 132 were picked up; 46 cats and 86 dogs. There were 22 sick or injured animals; 13 cats and nine dogs. There were six owner surrender animals which were all dogs. A four year comparison chart of reported strays was shown; 346 was a large increase from the past month. Possibly due to quarantine being lifted so everyone is out. A four year comparison chart of
			•

field return to owner was shown; 26 RTO's in June. Additional animals picked up included six dogs, 22 sick or injured animals, one welfare hold, and six shelter quarantines. A slide of the Geo Districts was shown. District 1 had no cats and two dog, District 2 had one cats and 15 dogs, District 3 had seven cats and 22 dogs, District 4 had 27 cats and 20 dogs, District 5 had seven cats and six dogs, District 6 had no cats and four dogs, and District 7 had four cats and 17 dogs. The reasons for the owner release animals was aggressiveness.

Gino Jimenez from City ACO gave their report to include 617 stray animal calls; 303 were gone on arrival and 314 were apprehended. 282 were impounded at the ASCMV; 103 dogs and 179 cats. There were 32 successful field return with 11 unsuccessful for a total of 42 identifiable stray animals. A three year comparison chart of stray animal calls was shown; last month was exceptional with how high the numbers were. A three year comparison chart of field RTO was shown; June was within average of the 30 amount with 32.

Reasons for owner release included 10 dogs that was one female, one male, and eight puppies where the owner was moving and could not take them, seven dogs from a residence of two adult females, one adult male, and four puppies as they were being evicted and could not take them, seven dogs where the owner could no longer take care of them and the rescue would not take them back, six dogs aggressive towards people or pets, five dogs the mom dog would not allow puppies to feed and the owner could not afford the vet visit, three dogs who were destructive with one owner given an eviction notice, three sick dogs, two dogs that killed owner's chickens, two dogs old with health issues that requested euthanasia, one dog that kept escaping, and one dog as the owner had no time for it.

The reasons of being unable to field RTO include eight had no contact with the owner by phone or at the residence, two chip was not registered, and one chip information was not current. A map of the strays was shown; blue dots are dogs, orange dots are cats, and red dots are anything other than dogs and cats. The map is available on the City of Las Cruces web page. He viewed West Hadley which had a tremendous number of cats picked up; each dot can be multiple animals but clicking on the dot will give you more information. There was discussion on how the addresses work when picking up strays; the address noted is where the animal was picked up not where it lived. Board Member Flores commented that the eviction owner releases will begin happening more and more due to lack of eviction protection. She suggested educating the public on receiving a lease that allows them to have animals.

B. Shelter Statistics/Activities: Clint Thacker gave the ASCMV Executive Director's report. The current animal count is 570; 361 dogs, 206 cats, and three others which is above the numbers from June 2020 but less than June 2019. Staff is currently working to lower the amount as 570 is too high with the staff available. Total intake for June is 785 compared to 562 for June 2020

and 1,044 for June 2019; included 420 dogs, 360 cats, and five other. Total June transfers to rescues is 247; the individual rescues with specific numbers were shown. Mr. Thacker specifically thanked ACTion Programs for Animals, Broken Promises SW, Colorado Puppy Rescue, the medical team, and the fosters. The Oregon Safe Haven Society were involved in the flight with Dog is my Co-Pilot and New Hope Rescue in Colorado also rescued 17 dogs and nine cats. Many rescues are freezing intake as they are full.

There were five returns of all dogs; four had a behavior issue and one lifestyle change. For behavior issues the Animal Shelter offers training lessons or alternatives but the owners don't always accept the help. There were 103 adoptions in 2021 compared to 72 adoptions in 2020; percentage was 13.1% in 2021 compared to 12.8% in 2020. Rescues were at 31.5%; reclaims were at 9.8%; community cats were at 4.6%; euthanasia was 20% of animals that have issues either medical or behavioral. The total is a 75% live release rate compared to June 2020 81.4% live release rate. Euthanasia reasons were mainly due to feral cats, general medical, and aggressive behavior of dogs. Total visitors in June was 842. Adoption appointments scheduled were 131; 106 were kept which totals 81% with 73 finalized adoptions which totals 56%. The website page views were 36,040 for the month of June; the second lowest of the year. Facebook views are at 3,092 which is the highest this year. The pets of the week are Robyn the cat and Carina the dog.

There was discussion on wildlife being in the euthanasia reason report; ASCMV needs to be the last resort. Board Member Flores suggested sharing information in the Sun News or Bulletin in regards to various issues. Mr. Thacker stated they have a grant writer who has come up with monthly topics to discuss and is talking with Sun News to include that. Vice-Chair Abeyta-Stuve commented that she likes the appointment setting and believes it's a good way to proceed for health of the shelter as well as giving people more pause to consider all sides of pet ownership.

Mr. Thacker introduced their new grant writer; Elaine Stacher Simon. Ms. Simon stated she's been with the Center since July 6th. She went on to give a brief history of her work; involved with different animal welfare efforts and currently involved with Kitty Glitter which is a jewelry sale that benefits the cat rescues in town. October 8th and 9th are the dates of the next sale. She has worked with grant writing at the New Mexico State University Foundation and worked with institutional donors and corporate sponsorships. She will meet with Sun News next week to discuss an informational column. She has reached out to corporate community residents to help such as spay and neuters.

Mr. Thacker added that the drive through clinic for vaccines and microchips will be at Field of Dreams; a post has been put on Facebook. Staff will utilize both parking lots. It will be August 22nd from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. The Center will

be closed with minimum staff to clean and feed the animals. There was discussion on the Center telling people to contact rescues first before the Center.

C. Committee Reports

1. **Finance - Eric Enriquez, Committee Chair:** The Finance Committee met June 15th. Josh Saffell gave the financial report. The unaudited financial statements as of June 30, 2021, included General Fund cash of \$1,411,000.00 and receivables of \$89,401.00 for a total assets of \$1,093,512.00; these numbers are preliminary as staff is still closing the month of June. Liabilities total \$84,714.00 with revenues collected in advance of \$179,869.00; this left an unassigned fund balance of \$828,929.00. Mr. Saffell stated that he had hoped for a drop in revenue collected in advance as they used grant funds but then they received \$150,000.00 additional. Capital Projects Fund includes cash of \$29,798.00 and Restricted Fund balance of \$29,798.00. Capital Assets were net of accumulated depreciation of \$181,759.00 with an unassigned fund balance of \$181,759.00.

Change in net position for all funds included General Fund total revenues at \$3,267,336.00 and total expenditures at \$2,610,155.00. The net change to fund balance was positive \$657,181.00. Neither the Capital Projects Fund nor the Capital Assets fund had revenue. The Capital Projects Fund had an expenditure of \$1,767.00 for a negative change to the fund balance of \$1,767.00. Capital Assets recognized depreciation of \$42,230.00 which was a negative \$42,230.00. There was discussion as to why revenue collected in advance is a liability; usually a grant which must be used for specific purposes.

The budget to actual change in net position is 94% of budgeted revenue and 73.4% of budgeted expenditures. The budget parameter for June was 100% due to being the end of the fiscal year. A line graph comparison of expenditures versus revenues was shown; the expenditures tend to be under revenues. Percentage of total expenditures included 73% personnel, 15% services, 6% supplies, 2% insurance, 2% repairs and maintenance, and 1% in other and capital. There was discussion of what services consist of, such as advertising. There was discussion on carryovers or changes for the fiscal year; not expected at the moment. The audited financial statement should be presented in March.

2. Executive – Manuel Sanchez, Committee Chair: Chair Sanchez stated that they met on July 14th as well as July 20th. They discussed Ms. Simon and the other four new employees, the updates on the

facilities, and rescue engagement based on community input. He added that he appreciates the effort Mr. Thacker has been doing on Facebook with updates and information.

3. Facilities - Kasandra Gandara, Committee Chair: Mr. Thacker stated that they met this month. They discussed the new Center being built with a completion date around the third or fourth quarter of 2022. Another discussion item was the issues with leaking window frame at the current Center in the surgery suite; frames filled with cement so not a simple swap but caulking will be done until replacement can be made. There are five full time and two part time positions that have been filled as early as next week. Recruitment has begun for more Animal Care Giver personnel and Bernice has begun the process for Animal Care Specialist. The rescue coordinators started on the 18th.

There was discussion on ARPA money and projects. Board Member Flores suggested talking with the contractors to use ARPA funding to help with the new Center. Mr. Thacker has contacted the City to request funding for what he believes is most important to bring back to the new Center which had to be taken out due to COVID. There was discussion on how the Center fared after the intense storm; the temporary awning was destroyed and a pole hit the transfer van window. Mr. Thacker added that a gate was bent and took two days to fix it. The van is the only other item to be fixed. There was discussion as to whether the damage was filed with insurance. Bernice Navarro added that currently they are in transition to a different insurance: the deductible is \$1,000.00.

V. Discussion Items

A. Rescue Engagement: Clint Thacker gave the presentation. The Center asked owner surrenders to first find a home for the animal before bringing them to ASCMV and if someone finds an animal they are asked to try and find the owner themselves; resources are given. Beginning in May and ending in August/September animals go up high and then back down. ASCMV is currently at the height of their impound amount.

The policies enacted are not new; centers have done this since 2017. Many additional changes were forced during the pandemic. One policy that began during the pandemic which will continue include appointment based owner surrenders; give alternatives before bringing them to ASCMV. Other policies include suspending low priority/non-emergency activity or calls for Animal Control Officers, appointment systems for adoptions, divert person to online portals to find an animal to adopt, and appointment system for intakes.

The handout was shown which lists other resources to find a home for an animal. ASCMV will take in the animal if all resources are exhausted or if the animal is in danger or sick. Dallas did a study that concluded animals, especially dogs, tend to stay within a quarter mile of where the animal is impounded. There was discussion of whether the agencies on the resources list were asked to be included; they were not asked but they are options on other publications at the Center. Staff is working on another addition where they contact the rescue to put what they can offer. Vice-Chair Abeyta-Stuve commented that she likes the idea of asking the rescues what they can offer and possibly take them off the list if they so choose.

There was discussion on e-mails from APA and Kathy Stark. Mr. Thacker has spoken with the individuals prior to the e-mail but has not responded to the e-mail; he believes a Board Member should respond. There was discussion as to whether there is relational issues with the rescues; Mr. Thacker doesn't believe so. Ex-Officio Member Ward stated that Doña Ana Animal Control has not been picking up owner release animals except for certain circumstances; not enough ACO's and the Center requires appointments. They will watch the stray numbers to see if they increase due to the change.

There was discussion on the how phone calls are handled for owner surrenders; they receive the information over the phone or via e-mail. There have been instances where people didn't believe they could take the animal to the ASCMV and instead left them in the desert or on a road. Chair Sanchez suggested to make it clearer that ASCMV is the final option. Mr. Thacker added that for strays they shouldn't go to rescues and staff doesn't tell them to; they are asked to hold onto the animal and try to find the owner. Owner surrenders are asked to find a place for the animal as it's their responsibility and the ASCMV will only take them as a last resort or under extreme circumstances.

There was discussion on requirements of keeping a stray animal; there isn't but they fill out a lost animal report. Chair Sanchez commented that he had heard there was a 72 hour hold for a stray animal before ASCMV would take them; there isn't. There was discussion on a possible process for all animals to go to the ASCMV who then coordinates with the rescues to get the animals to rescues. Some issues would include population control, numbers and illnesses would increase, also rescues choose what animals they take which means they would take the easily adoptable ones and leave the large animals in the Center. There was discussion on what has been learned from e-mails and responses.

Chair Sanchez suggested having the rescues come to present directly to the Board; one a month. He suggested asking the rescues that engage the most with ASCMV to make up the list of the first 12 months. Board Member Flores suggested limiting the presentations and possibly do two organizations per meeting. She added that she believes the e-mails were well intentioned but the senders don't seem to understand how the ASCMV works. She believes they need to keep the public educated to the policies of the Center. Chair Sanchez agrees with multiple organizations with time limits. Vice-Chair Abeyta-Stuve agrees with the suggestion. She added that they should seek out input from rescues for policy making if it directly affects them.

Vice-Chair Abeyta-Stuve commented that public education is important as many times people can be highly stressed when bringing an animal in and when they are initially told no it could come across as negative customer service. She believes putting out information is the best way forward to show the rescues that ASCMV is informing the public of their options and the public will be more aware of what to do in those situations. Chair Sanchez asked staff to schedule two rescue presentations for August. Mr. Thacker stated that the majority of the rescue groups have full time jobs and would potentially not be able to attend. ASCMV has created a private rescue Facebook page where staff will post asking for people to sign up. Vice-Chair Abeyta-Stuve suggested that if the rescue can't attend they could create a small presentation to submit.

Mr. Thacker stated that while many of them work full time they could potentially have a break or lunch break to present via Zoom if the Board will allow it. He requests to go back to Zoom meetings due to flexibility and easier to hold the meetings with multiple people. Chair Sanchez suggested going hybrid with both in person and Zoom. Board Member Flores stated they could do call-ins as well. She is a firm believer with meeting in person. There was discussion on the benefits and drawbacks of Zoom; all meetings should be in person due to state restrictions being lifted. Vice-Chair Abeyta-Stuve suggested looking into modifying items for inclusion of a hybrid mode that includes Zoom with public meetings due to accessibility. Chair Sanchez suggested that the rescue could record a video with their presentation if they're unable to attend.

B. Audit Entrance Conference: Chris Garner from Patillo, Brown, & Hill gave the presentation. During the development of the risk assessment Josh or Josie with City Finance Department can contact Mr. Garner or Heather Lucero regarding any questions. Currently they are in the middle of the planning stages with the audit; it is happening remotely. During this stage they are gaining an understanding of internal control, testing the internal controls, and walking through transactions; this will end sometime in August.

The New Mexico State Auditor requires they test certain compliance issues such as procurement, use of e-cards and travel cards, and etcetera. Mr. Garner is also planning for any single audits that need to be completed such as certain federal grants; most likely won't affect the organization. The risk assessment will allow the Board to be involved. Based on internal control testing and other testing during planning, they develop risk assessment to determine audit procedures to finalize the audit. The Board can send any concerns or input to Mr. Garner or Ms. Lucero. The risk assessment should be completed in August.

The next phase of the audit includes field work. They will come in September and October to complete the field work testing. The goal is to send the financial statement to the state auditor by the end of November; they are due December 1st. In October or November time frame, management will give Mr. Garner the drafted financial statement, they will review and go over changes, and submit it to the state auditor by November. Mr. Garner discussed the responsibilities of the auditor; express an opinion with reasonable assurance. The federal responsibilities includes testing internal controls without an opinion but communicate any weaknesses as findings in the report; New Mexico rules are more stringent than federal standards.

The financial numbers are management's responsibility; meet the standards of Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP). Management is also responsible for implementing internal controls to ensure the controls are properly safeguarding access. Mr. Garner discussed the scope of the audit. It will include the City of Las Cruces, the South Central Solid Waste Authority, the downtown tax increment development district, Animal Service Center of Mesilla Valley, Mesilla Valley Regional Dispatch Authority, and Metro Narcotics Agency. Five separate audits will be issued; the downtown TID is the only one without a separate audit. During the audit there will be status updates; communicate potential findings and etcetera. As per the New Mexico Audit Rule the Board cannot publicly talk about the status of the audit such as potential findings, until the audit is completely accepted by the New Mexico auditor. Mr. Garner explained the process.

Changes to the Audit Rule for 2021 include clarifications to terms and added wording, payments from 70% to 95% can now be made once the audit has been submitted to the State Auditor, change in auditor rotation requirements by retaining an auditor for eight years rather than six, and retiree health care testing by matching it with the PARA contributions. Mr. Garner explained the rule change in more detail. A new standard to be implemented deals with the acquisition of an organization where there would be 100% control in the organization; should not affect the audit.

VI. ACTION ITEM

A. Resolution 2021-06: FY 22 Grant Funds Carry-Over and Budget Adjustments: Motion by Board Member Ellins, second by Board Member Flores. William Blanchard gave the presentation. He has made an amendment to this resolution; the new resolution was given this morning.

Authority; they are the auditors but do not represent it.

The resolution is to carryover some ASCMV grants and adjust two other grants to actuals. The budget for Carroll Petrie General Operating Support Grant is being increased; came in after the fiscal 2022 budget was completed. Both revenue and expense will be increased by \$150,000.00. The budget for Carroll Petrie Foundation COVID 19 grant will be decreased by \$6,010.00; spending occurred after the fiscal 2022 budget was completed. The budget for Maddie's Fund Pet Foster Care grant will also be decreased in revenue and expense by \$3,888.00; spending occurred after the fiscal 2022 budget was completed.

Mr. Garner stated that any information given to the auditors for concerns or

input will be kept confidential and only used for auditing purposes; some

potential confidential items were shown. There was discussion on who to

go for with any concerns, contact Mr. Garner or Ms. Lucero. There was

discussion on whether they represent the South Central Solid Waste

Motion to update the resolution as presented with the amendment by Vice-Chair Abeyta-Stuve, second by Chair Sanchez. Resolution motion passed.

VII. PUBLIC INPUT: Frank Bryce from Humane Society of Southern New Mexico recommended that a staff volunteer to evaluate the stray animal when it comes in to see where it'd be able to go. People have told him that they were told they had to go to the rescues rather than ASCMV and that they are required to hold the animal 72 hours. He suggested creating a new protocol where they are evaluated before being told to go to a rescue. He added that not all the organizations are available to answer the phone all the time as well. He likes the idea of having the Center being a hub by taking the animal in and then contacting the rescues.

Mr. Bryce commented that there was a news article on spay and neuter. He would like to commend the effort and is pleased with the way this Board is operating. He would like the Center to try and see if they can legally get spay and neuter animals for rescue organizations. The article is in the Sun News; issue of homeless animals attributed to lack of spay and neuter. Mr. Bryce added that their organization has been working on this issue for over 20 years; still needs cost effective options. He added that the Center is doing a great job with stray cats and TNR.

Attached are the unaudited financial results of the Animal Service Center operations for the period ended July 31, 2021. Some observations for your consideration:

- The Statement of Net Position (page 1) reported cash of \$1,266,078 in the General Fund. Total assets were \$1,673,714. Accrued payroll liabilities ended at \$64,301. Total liabilities were \$250,350. The unassigned fund balance was \$1,423,364.
- The Capital Projects Fund reported restricted fund balance of \$29,798. \$28,000 is due to a transfer from the General Fund in fiscal year 2020; \$1,798 was the balance remaining for the Stern Cat Room Donation
- The Statement of Revenues and Expenditures (page 2) showed YTD operating revenues in the General Fund at \$730,746. YTD operating expenditures were \$126,622 with an operating income of \$604,124.
- The Statement of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balance Budget to Actual (page 3) indicated 19.2% of budgeted revenues and 3.3% of budgeted expenditures had been recognized.
- All expenditures were below the budget parameter of 8.3%.
- The Grants and Donations Schedule, page 9, provides a summary of grants and donations received.
