1 Ellins: Ad hoc Member Lusk, is there anybody here from the County? You look 2 like you're from the City. 3 4 Members of the Board my name is Gino Jimenez. Animal Control Jimenez: 5 Supervisor for City of Las Cruces. Mr. Chairman, at this time we typically 6 have County do their presentation first. However, Officer Snow is 7 relatively new to this presentation so he asked me to go first so that he 8 could follow my example. 9 10 Ellins: Be a good mentor. 11 12 Jimenez: Thank you sir. So I will present your numbers for April 2019. City of Las 13 Cruces responded to 512 reported strays. 59 of those were GOA. We were successful in apprehending 253. 220 were impounded at the 14 shelter. 117 of those were dogs, 103 were cats. We were successful in 15 16 field RTO 33 and unsuccessful in 60. That made the total of 93 17 identifiable animals. 18 19 Excuse me Gino. At that time could we go back to that slide? Eakman: 20 21 Jimenez: Yes sir. 22 23 Ellins: 93 out of 253? 24 Yes sir. 25 Jimenez: 26 27 Ellins: What is that, about a third? 28 29 Jimenez: About a third, yes sir. It is an increase in our last numbers. 30 31 Ellins: There's more identified this time percentage wise, but we're still ... okay 32 thank you. 33 34 Jimenez: Yes sir. That number is rising. Not as quickly as we'd like it to, sir, but 35 yes, it's on the upward trend. 36 What were the reasons for the, go back to the previous slide, the 37 Ellins: 38 unsuccessful attempted field returns? 39 40 Jimenez: Mr. Chairman. There are various reasons for that. For example, if the 41 officers are able to apprehend a dog that has identifiable tags but nobody's home at that time, or if it is a minor child that is the only person 42 at home we can't hold a minor responsible. So therefore we have to take 43 it to Animal Shelter to allow an adult to redeem it. And the third most 44 45 common reason is if that adult responsible party is unable to restrain the dog, to make the remedies to keep that dog at home at that time. Then 46

we basically take the animal to the shelter to give them time to fix it and then they know where their animal will be.

So here is our three-year comparison for stray animals. A little uptick this month compared to the other May's; May 2018 and 2017. And here is our three-year field RTO comparison. For the new Members of the Board, you'll see that in 2017 there was a spike in our field RTO's. That was contributed to us returning 60 goats that had gotten loose from a contractor that was permitted through the City for weed removal. His goats got out, we returned them, so that 60 really took our number up right there. And I will stand for any questions.

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Ellins: Any questions Board Members? Thank you.

1314 Jimenez

Jimenez: Thank you sir.

16 Snow:

Good morning Mr. Chairman and Members of the Board. I'm Jim Snow. Doña Ana County Animal Control Officer. I will be presenting the presentation this morning for Mary Lou Ward supervisor who was unable to attend.

Starting out with for April 2019, Doña Ana County Animal Control picked up 230 animals. We had 10 owner release dogs out of that. We had zero owner release cats. We picked up 106 stray dogs. Stray cats were 47. Animal care and welfare of seven, injured animals 13, rabies quarantines of 10. The total to the shelter for April was 194. We had one livestock, three snakes, and 32 dead animals.

The total RTO's for the month of April were 58 plus. We had microchip scanned were 207. Not scanned were snakes, livestock, vicious animals, and some dead animals. We had 41 microchips found, successfully traced 18 ID's of nine visible tags.

The types of calls we responded to for April, the ACOs responded to 975 calls for service, six ACO cases went to court in April. We had 32 injured animal calls, four cruelty calls, 43 vicious animal calls, 22 bite calls. Seven were animal bites to other animals, 13 not current on rabies vaccinations, one current on their rabies vaccinations, and one was a rat bite. Filled educated animal got compliance on 27 licensing and microchip, 51 permits, 27 rabies vaccinations, 49 care and maintenance or ordinance violations.

The Spay and Neuter pilot project in the Doña Ana area as of April 21, 2019, we have visited 1,512 residences. We had dogs already fixed of the 1,025. We had 245 cats already fixed. We had 545 homes with no animals. We had 50 vacant properties. Dogs that are intact were 277, cats that are intact 33. We left notices on 318 properties. We gave out 141 vouchers. Total animals already fixed was 1,093. Total animals intact before project so far, 310.

Ellins:

Is that the number of animals that were fixed?

1 2 Snow: Yes. I believe so on that. The educational outreach continues. The 3 ACES projects, the latest ACES project through February and March of 4 2019 was in the Radium Springs area. We visited 53 properties. We had 5 122 total hours in this project. We had total Officers on the project of 19. 6 We had a 69% increase in compliance on this. 7 At the Cleanup of Carlos event or Dumpster Day, we had 6.5 tons 8 of tires and 5.5 tons of trash picked up at this event. Our reported number of animals in the area, we had 57 dogs; 22 of them were altered; one was 9 10 too old to be altered with vet certification on that. Intact and unknown, we 11 had 35. We had six cats, three of them were altered, three were unknown 12 whether they were intact or not. I believe that is the end of my 13 presentation. Any questions from the Board? 14 15 Ellins: Board Member Gonzalez. 16 17 Gonzalez: Mr. Snow, in regard to the stray dogs 106 of them, are these Countywide 18 or is it from a certain area that you scope more? 19 20 Snow: That's Countywide sir. 21 22 Okay. Thank you. Gonzalez: 23 24 Snow: Thank you. Any further questions? 25 26 Ellins: I have a question for ad hoc. Vicki Lusk. How is the redemption on the 27 vouchers going? 28 29 SNAP can probably report on that too during their report, but Chair the Lusk: 30 redemptions are still kind of slow. We're kind of surprised at it because it's 31 a free voucher or an opportunity for a free or a low cost voucher depending on their income status. But they are slow to get those turned in 32 33 and we're doing follow up calls at each residence to find out why. And we will start enforcement action if they do not seek either to get their animal 34 35 spayed or neutered or to get an intact permit. Because one or the other is 36 required. 37 38 Ellins: Could it be that Doña Ana's a far distance from Las Cruces which deters 39 people? Especially in the colonias? 40 41 Lusk: Chairman. I'm not sure if that's the reason. When we give out the 42 certificates, the Officers are asking if transportation is an issue and we're 43 not hearing that from the residents. They're not saying that they don't 44 have transportation or that transportation is an issue. 45

Ellins: Thank you.

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Eakman: Mr. Chair.

I do have a question. What is your usual protocol when you find an animal Eakman: that has not been vaccinated for rabies? I noticed you had 13 of them

here.

Snow: We talk to the owner, if it is a known owner and we give them time to get it done. Generally on a vaccination one week to get it done within that

week. If not, then they will be cited.

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Eakman: Thank you. And I would like to congratulate Doña Ana County on these

efforts that they're using right now to help with the problem of too many intact animals, which means too many stray animals in the future. Thank

you for that.

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#### B. Shelter Statistics and Activities/Educational and Spay-Neuter Initiatives

Ellins:

Bernice.

Navarro:

Good morning Mr. Chair, Members of the Board. I am standing in for Mr. Thacker today. He is out of town teaching, training some officers. So I will be presenting the numbers for today.

Our intake for April 2019, we had 451 dogs, 311 cats, nine other animals. So it was a total of 771 animals coming into the shelter. A comparison from 2018 to 2019, the dogs did increase just slightly but the number of cats did decrease a bit. So there was a small change. We did take just a few less animals, about 60 less animals in this year than we did compared to last year.

Our April 2019 outcomes, we had 177 adoptions, 88 reclaims, 277 rescues, 100 community cats. We had 74 animals that were euthanized for 9.6% and our live release rate was just under our goal of 90% at 89.7%. It was very close. So comparing 2018 to 2019, adoptions did increase, however, our reclaims again did decrease. The rescues were 277, were a little bit lower than last year. The community cats did increase a little bit. So our euthanasia rate was up slightly from last year at 9.6% versus 7.3% and the live release rate again was just a little below what it was from last year.

Currently this was our animal count as of yesterday compared to the same date from last year. So as you can see there is quite a bit of difference in the number of animals that are housed at the shelter. This year we are currently at 489 and last year was almost at 700. At this time I invite Dominique to share a little bit about our volunteers.

Clark:

Good morning. Members of the Board. Volunteers, here are a few fun pictures. The two on the right, on my right were from adoption events. We're trying really hard to make sure that we're more user friendly and I mean that in the sense that we just allow for more engagement. So you can see one of our new signs in the back. We've had that for a little bit already, but this is a good picture where you can see it and we hang that at all of our adoption events. On the far left, we were doing a photography project on site. And that's where we do the weekly photography for our database of adoptable animals and where we do our 12 dogs photography.

So for the month of April, we had 407 volunteer hours and a total number of 280 volunteers. Again, I always like to mention in full transparency that this is not a continuous active 280 number. When school is in session, it varies through different types of the season. But this is how many people we have in our database that actively want to stay on the database and come in when they can. I make sure every about two months I send out "okay, I'm cleaning up the e-mail list again" and so that is an accurate number.

So those hours went towards, 70 hours went towards cats and laundry, and that's just cat enrichment on site; whether it be helping take care of the cats and the cages and helping with laundry. Our Farmers and Petco adoptions, which are adoptions every weekend, was 155 hours. We had Harley-Davidson and we had the Order of the Eagles event which was in Old Mesilla and that was 85 volunteer hours. We had Pet's Barn and Petco cat care where we have our offsite catteries and that was 30 hours put in by volunteers. We have our photography teams which is our dog photography and our cat photography and that's 33 hours. We did have 30 hours of Excel which we have Excel students on site. And we have socialization which was four hours. Typically, compared to last year our socialization numbers are a little bit higher and we're hoping to bring that back up now that our remodel is completely pretty much done.

And then on our left we have Katherine and so every week we do Pet of the Week videos. I'm not sure if you all have seen them on our Facebook page, but this was a video we had just finished shooting at the park. Those are her two fosters, Joey and Leroy. Then on the right is a fun picture at an adoption event. This family actually had just adopted that dog. For our foster program, we have 12 families with 43 animals currently. And then some more fun pictures. Which the one on the right is like my absolute favorite. I hope it is yours too. And that's all for me. Bernice. Thank you.

1 2 Navarro: Currently we do have 94 animals in the foster to adopt program. As you 3 know, that number has been decreasing slowly. So as we continue to get 4 those that are in the foster to adopt in and get them sterilized, that number 5 is dropping and sterilizing more in the shelter before they leave. Hopefully 6 that's going to continue to drop and pretty soon we should have very 7 minimal in that program. 8 The total surgeries in April, we had 47 for the public, 95 community 9 cats, 75 for our adoptions, 137 for the shelter. So that gave us a total of 10 11 12 Ellins: Bernice, go back to that previous slide. We are reducing, we have a 13 program to reduce the normal public surgeries, is that correct? 14 15 Navarro: That is what we're currently doing, yes. 16 17 Ellins: So you're just honoring those who had a previous appointment or 18 somehow in the stream? 19 20 Navarro: Yes, that is correct. And then once we get those numbers down and we do have the majority sterilized from the shelter itself, then we are hoping to 21 22 look into doing some more and adding some more public surgeries in the 23 future. 24 25 Ellins: But for the moment you want to get down to zero. 26 27 Navarro: But for the moment, yes we are not accepting new ones. Only the ones 28 that have been reclaimed from the shelter and those that have already 29 been scheduled. 30 Ellins: 31 Thank you. 32 33 Navarro: So one of the things that we have done is consolidated how we're reporting the numbers, the visitors to the shelter. As you know, the 34 35 majority of our construction has been completed. We are operating out of the new lobby. So we only have one sign in sheet now. Before we 36 separated it from the reclaim side and the adoption side. We just have the 37 one sign in sheet, so all of the medical numbers everything like that will be 38 39 altogether. But we do still have each of the items that we have them sign 40 in for. 41 Those that came in looking to adopt or adopting for the month of 42 April was a little over 1,100. Medical 283. Those who were looking for 43 missing pets were 355. Those who brought in or found a stray animal was 86. And one note on that, on the found or stray animals we do try to 44

encourage those who find the animals if they can hold on to the animals instead of having them impounded into the shelter. What we do is we take

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their information, we get the animals picture, we have a notebook there that people can go through, we bring them into the system so that they can be shown on the website, and you can have access to looking for those animals. So that's how many were brought as found but not necessarily how many were impounded into the shelter.

Owner surrenders was 52. Those who came in for pet licensing, 82. Members of rescue organizations, 46. Those coming in for euthanasia or cremation for their animals was 33. And other was 82. So that gave us a grand total for the month of April for 2,171.

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Ellins: Why are owners surrendering their animals for euthanasia?

13 Navarro:

I'm sorry, I didn't understand.

Ellins: Why are owners surrendering their animals for euthanasia?

Why are they surrendering for euthanasia?

Ellins: Yes.

Navarro:

Navarro:

There are different reasons. Some of the pets are older and so they feel that it's time to let the dog go home. So they come in to have them euthanized. There are a few that sometimes bring them in because they feel the animal is very aggressive and so they're not able to care for them. Things like that. So there are a few different reasons why they come in and bring them in.

Community outreach, we continue to go to the radio station. Wilson Binkley continues to work on our advertising campaign. If you haven't yet, we invite you to go into the lobby. They have put together a few little slide shows that are educational, giving a few statistics, giving the prices for different things that constantly shows on our screens that we have in the lobby. So we do have educational information that's going out to the public and we thank Wilson Binkley for putting those together for us. Dog'Cruces magazine, the Classifieds. If you haven't yet also check the Facebook. We're continuing to give the numbers on the Facebook. There's a lot of good information that you can get from that. And we continue to have the DACS senior program that they sponsor for payment or partial payment for animals that are adopted from there.

One thing that I did want to include that I forgot to mention when Dominique was speaking about the hours for the volunteers. We had a little bit of a training session this past month also. It was noted that some of the cleaning protocols were being done a little differently. Where they were taking care of the cats on the off-sites at Pet's Barn and Petco and things, so we did offer a training class to all of the volunteers that do that for us. So there were a few more hours with that. They came in, we had a couple of our techs from the shelter, they reiterated the cleaning

protocols that we're supposed to follow. So that way we can keep up and make sure that the cats stay healthy at the offsite adoption centers. That was a little increase too.

And that's Gouda, was our pet of the week. And a couple of our other animals. And Montana is my favorite. If you have any other questions.

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Ellins: Questions by the Board? Thank you.

Navarro: Thank you.

#### C. Committee Reports

#### 1. Finance - David Dollahon, Committee Chair

Ellins: At this time we'll take up committee reports. Finance. Mr. Dollahon.

Dollahon: I'm going to start with Mr. Saffell.

 Saffell:

Good morning Mr Chair, Members of the Board. My name is Josh Saffell and on behalf of the Finance Department of the City of Las Cruces, I'd like to present the unaudited financials as of April 2019.

On the balance sheet, if you have the packet before you that's page one, Statement of Net Position. The general fund is showing about \$370,000 in cash and \$89,000 in receivables. Total liabilities in the general fund are about \$53,000. Overall the fund balance is at \$406,000 with \$164,000 unassigned.

Now looking at operations, this is going to be page two, Statements of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balance. We see the general fund is showing about \$2,429,000 in revenue and \$2,243,000 in expenditure, which gives us a positive net change to fund balance of \$186,000. Looking at the percentages, the actual to budget. The total revenues are at 86.1% of budget and the total expenses are at 77.3% of budget. Our budget target for this period is about 83.3%. So revenues are slightly higher than that which is good and expenditures are slightly lower.

Here we show actual revenues compared to budget. The actual revenues of \$2,429,000 are mainly due to Doña Ana and City contributions per the Joint Powers Agreement. Here we see our expenditure comparisons. Overall, many of the cost categories are underneath the 83.3%. There are four that are not. Those four are temporary agency services at 96.5%. This was due to several vacancies in the front office and in kennel positions. But those were filled as of April 29, 2015. So we shouldn't see that number going up much more from this point forward.

Repairs and maintenance are 85.4%. This was just due of course as we discussed in previous months vehicle repair, some demolition, and some electrical work. That's still kind of bringing that number up a little bit. Supplies are at 89% and that's due to food purchases, software purchases, and uniform purchases. Our insurance is at 87% which was of course due to the payment of work comp premiums.

Looking at our Capital Projects Fund. We show cash of \$200,000. A liability of \$77,000, which of course is monies received in advance for PetSmart grant. And of course the fund balance is at \$123,000. \$50,000 of that is restricted for the cat room and \$73,000 of that is committed for the project. That will conclude the April financial report. Are there any questions?

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Ellins: Board Member Smith.

1516 Smith:

Thank you Mr. Chairman. And thank you Mr. Saffell. I was just curious your reference to 2015 on the temporary agency services. You said something about 2015, something being filled at that point, and I wasn't sure if you simply meant to say April 2019. But if it was referring back to something in 2015 I was really curious as to how that was working.

Saffell: I do apologize if I said 2015. I meant 2019. They were filled as of April 29, 2019. Sorry.

Thank you very much. No, I certainly transpose numbers myself every once in a while, but I just wanted to be sure. Thank you. Thank you Mr. Chair. Thank you Mr. Saffell.

Ellins: Any other questions for the moment?

31 Dollahon:

Smith:

Mr. Chairman, Members of the Board. I don't have anything else. We are moving to a regular Finance Committee meeting to be toward the end of the month. It doesn't work perfectly for finance staff, but we will get a touch in at the end of the month on year to date expenses or month to date expenses. So Board Member Sanchez and Board Member Eakman and I along with Finance and Budget staff have coordinated that. So as we go forward with future meetings we'll be about two weeks from this meeting that the Finance Committee will have met. So we've missed April and parts of May so far, but we'll fix that at the end of this month and then going forward.

The only other thing I need to do is I'm going to ask Ms. Terri Gayhart. She doesn't even have to leave from her chair she just needs to stay and wave her hand. Ms. Terri Gayhart is the City's new Finance Director and she's been with us for a couple of months. So she's responsible for City accounting, purchasing, disbursements, and treasury management. I will be happy to, she is an animal lover, she's the proud

owner of three bloodhounds I believe. Black and tans. American black and tan coon hounds. So she's amongst family here at the Animal Service Center and she told me that she wasn't coming up to speak unless there was a puppy here and I explained to her why we don't do that. So you may not see Ms. Gayhart very often. You will most likely see Amador or Josh who loves speaking before Boards about our financial status.

The other lady who's trying to avoid being seen is Ms. Josie Medina who you've probably, some of you've seen in the past. She used to be our budget analyst. She is now the City's Accounting Manager and she's Josh and Amador's supervisor. So we just wanted to make those quick introductions. You generally won't see those two because Josh and Amador handle the day-to-day stuff really well for us. So we're in pretty good shape. And I'll be back to present the budget resolution later.

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#### 2. Executive - Lynn Ellins, Committee Chair

19 Ellins:

All right, the Executive Committee which is my report. I want to report on two Executive Committee meetings. One of which I did not want to discuss last month because there was some unresolved issues that have since been resolved.

A question arose as to whether or not perhaps in a court order when the Executive Director received an order to euthanize an animal, whether or not the Executive Director had any discretion with regard to taking such action. This led to a meeting with the County Animal Control Officers and the County Manager, myself, and Ex-Officio Member Lusk and her staff. After reading the statute and thrashing everything out it was determined that the Executive Director does have discretion. For instance, if the animal has been recommended for euthanasia by an Animal Control Officer, if the Executive Director determines that the animal is otherwise adoptable and the offense committed by the animal is relatively minor, such as chasing chickens, that the Director has the discretion to put that animal out for adoption with appropriate disclosures to the adopting family. Don't let that dog near chickens. That was an outcome that everyone was pleased with and Ex-Officio Member Lusk and her staff were okay with.

At the last meeting on May 1st, we discussed the shelters role and mission as to whether or not it completely captures or doesn't capture everything that the shelter does. And it was agreed that there are things that we do that go beyond the role and mission statement of the shelter. And I've asked the Executive Director to submit a memo to me for circulation describing those kinds of activities that we undertake that go beyond the role and mission of the Board. And I expect to receive that upon his return. We also discussed the fact that the veterinarian has accepted a new position and the difficulties that we might have in

attracting somebody to fill that slot. Bernice, do you have any information on that for the moment?

Navarro:

The advertisement, the position has been posted through the City and also through a couple of other agencies. We're working on getting it posted with the American Veterans Medical Association. But it is in a couple of other places right now. So we are actively pursuing, expecting to get some applications in hopefully soon. And we are actively working on trying to get a new medical director. This will be, the one that we currently have, she will be leaving at the end of June. So we are hoping to get somebody to start at the first of July.

Ellins: Okay, thank you. That concludes my report.

#### 3. Facilities - Greg Smith, Committee Chair

Ellins: The next report is Board Member Smith on Facilities.

Smith:

Thank you Mr. Chairman. We met a week ago on May 2nd and the things that we had on the list there are things that we discussed; were that the new furniture was schedule to be delivered on Monday, May 9th. Bernice is nodding. We're getting nodded heads so I'm assuming that it was delivered and everything is in great shape. Also, one thing that I brought up with a couple of folks is that if that furniture, the old furniture is not otherwise spoken for, we might have a place for it at the armory where we're accepting asylum seekers.

The new cat cages we're waiting for an okay from the City of Las Cruces Purchasing. Do we know of the current status on that as far as if those are moving forward? Okay, so we're still waiting on that. The new offices have been completed as has been mentioned a couple of times and the whole addition and other remodeling have received a Certificate of Substantial Completion. There was insufficient money in the budget to set up the new laundry room. Because there were additional complications about the size of the service to the water service and wastewater service to that area. So we're looking at that laundry service being a part of the 2020 budget.

An architectural firm has been selected for the new facility. I saw in a notice elsewhere, although they weren't able to tell us for sure or it wasn't public at that point, but more recently I saw that that was ASA Architects that was selected to do that. Is that correct Mr. Dollahon?

Dollahon:

Mr. Chairman Board Member Smith. That is correct. That is scheduled for award at your next regularly scheduled Council Meeting of May 20th. We've completed contract negotiations. But until such time as the Council acts it's not official. But we anticipate that will be done at the May 20th meeting, which is a very full agenda.

1 2 Smith:

Thank you Mr. Dollahon. Yes, and I'll be in Washington D.C. but I'll be trying to call in. Anyway, I saw that on that agenda. I couldn't remember exactly where I had seen it, but so that is on the agenda to be voted on at that particular point, along with several other GO Bond items.

The air study has been done and the HVAC work for the kennels is about to begin. Then on that particular day about over 70 animals were heading out to Phoenix. And even though that's not strictly a facilities thing, it was definitely part of our sensibility about what is working as far as the sending animals out. So if there are no questions or other comments regarding the Facilities, that's my report. I'm thrilled that we are at the point of where we have maybe a few details to finish on the remodel but otherwise the furniture's in and people are able to move into those offices. Thank you Mr. Chairman.

Navarro:

Dollahon:

When will the grand opening take place?

18 Smith:

A grand opening? We were looking to be sure that everything was actually accomplished. So it looks like Ms. Navarro might be able to share a little bit more on that.

No, I was just going to confirm that that we don't have a date yet. But as soon as Mr. Thacker comes back I'm sure we'll be getting that in order and send information out to everybody.

Smith: Thank you Ms. Navarro. Thank you Mr. Chairman.

Alex, did you want to give a guick presentation?

30 Flores:

Good morning. Members of the Board, Chairman. My name is Alex Flores. I'm the Property Project Manager with Public Works and a lot of the things have been covered by Board Member Smith. But as you may know we issue a Substantial Completion on this project on April 18. Since then the building's been occupied. We have a certificate, as you can see on the project and we're still within the budget on this project. There's been a new gravel surface parking lot being provided too for overflow parking with the facility. And also we have been getting furnishings on the building. As you can see on the picture there's a lot of boxes and crates being delivered to the site.

On the project status, we have the new IT infrastructure in place. The microwave relay. There's been also a new video surveillance system in place as well, as well as the new access control card reader system. It's my understanding that we're working with our facilities staff to issue card readers and cards to everybody on staff.

As you can see we have the new furnishings in the offices. On the look ahead, there are a few punch list items that the contractor's still

working on. Most of them have been completed. The final things that we're looking for is final payment and also the *(inaudible)*. So we're getting the final payment to the contractor at end project acceptance once all the punch list items have been completed. There's also, we're working on restriping the front parking lot to alleviate some of the directional issues on the parking. And also additional signage. As Mr. Smith said, we're waiting for those delivery installation of the new cat cages and also we're waiting for the grand opening.

On the additional projects, we do have Parker, Smith, and Cooper working on the design for the HVAC on the interior kennels. Their design is scheduled to be completed by June 10th. At that point, we will issue the bid for this project. And then also they did test assessment on the roof and we'll need a new roof as well. So that will be a part of the project as well. On the exterior kennels, we're doing an in-house design for that. We do have some contracts that we're issuing at the moment. And we expect to start construction here in the next couple weeks. If you have any questions.

Ellins:

#### D. Zero in 7 Update

Ellins: Next is Zero in 7 update.

Good morning Mr. Chair and Board. I'm Jean Gilbert. I'm the secretary for the Coalition for Pets and People. Here's the mission statement for the Coalition which was adopted in March 2017. Here is a listing of community organizations that will be represented in the slides. And here is a listing of Coalition activities for the month of April. We were at the volunteer fair and in a minute you'll be seeing photos from that. And secretary is spelled wrong there.

Chair and secretary myself, we held a meeting April 20th. Rick Hahn, the chair, was on KTAL radio on April 26th talking to some extent about microchipping. Because the Coalition is actively involved in

supporting microchipping events as well as other activities. And the Coalition, we were involved in the recent ACES which was April 27th in Berino. And Rick is currently in the Coalition. We're working on drafting a microchip brochure and a lost pets brochure to eventually have in circulation. We participated in some fundraisers too this month. Cat's Meow, HSSNM, and SHAS.

Here's a picture of Rick Hahn the chair staffing our booth at the volunteer fair. And there were between 1,500 and 1,600 people at that event and there was over \$18,000 raised with matching funds through the Community Foundation and United Way for 58 non-profits. And here is a picture of us. We were the animal welfare organizations that were represented at the community at the City volunteer fair. And here you see April and Terry with Community Foundation and Rick Hahn representing the Coalition. Myself representing the Humane Society of Southern New Mexico and then Tricia Quillen representing Safe Haven and Ryan Steinman who's the volunteer director with the City. Another photo from the volunteer fair is a member of our board, Humane Society Board, Casey Jobling.

Then you see the Humane Society stats for the month of April. Hokey Wiley has been popular lately with her dogs Olivia and Knox. You see her at Grace Village in the one with her Boston bull and with her Boxer that we are over at Onate High School special ed. We did 41 humane education sessions this month and our adoptions are a total of 17 year to date. And our Cans for Critters is over 8,000, helping 179 animals. And our microchip numbers are 7,600.

In addition HSSNM, we have a pet helpline. So we do a lot of work through that. We've worked with Good Samaritan so that they'll retain the animals that they've found to bypass the shelter. We helped with, worked with Animal Control on a pit bull that was believed to be a *(inaudible)* dog. We've helped resolve a small hoarding case with a person who themselves was infected with scabies and so were their five cats. We've helped TNR cats from a colony of 22 and we assisted in the month of April with three dogs helping to get them spayed and neutered.

Here is Frank Bryce, the President of Humane Society. Frank is a herpetologist and here he is at the Southwest Environmental Center doing a presentation living with native reptiles. Part of our humane education work. And I want to thank Gino Jimenez for coordinating this for the Boys and Girls Club. This is a critter connection session and Officer Jimenez was able to secure Officer Vega and Officer Ontiveros. Officer Vega demonstrated tools that are used in the field by the officers and here he's showing a control pull. Then Officer Ontiveros is bringing L.I.B.B.Y., brought L.I.B.B.Y. to the Boys and Girls Club and showed the children how the training and then also the dog (*inaudible*). The reward for the dog is a tug toy and so the kids really enjoyed seeing how that's used. L.I.B.B.Y. stands for, and maybe you can help me, Las Cruces Is Beautiful Because of You. That's what L.I.B.B.Y.'s name stands for.

Cat's Meow, they've had over 75 adoptions this year and they have about 50 fosters. They had a very successful spring fling that some of us with the Coalition attended during April at the Rio Grande Winery. And here's a picture of Cleo shown at their facility and then Cleo pictured in her new home.

Forever Homes Animal Rescue, you've seen previous slides about them and you've heard mention of Jamie Jones who is the Las Cruces coordinator. I have a picture of Jamie and she is the gal holding the Chihuahua mix who she pulled from the shelter through Forever Homes Animal Rescue. Jamie is her foster until, I believe the dog's name is Blondie, is adopted or is placed in another, with another rescue. Forever Homes Animal Rescue does a lot of advocating for the shelter and here you see a picture of a senior dog who needed a home, pictured with her adopter. Some of the advocating for the dog was done by Forever Homes Animal Rescue. Forever Homes Animal Rescue rescued and transported over 2,000 animals last year. And they're home base is in Alamogordo.

Here is a slide of APA with their stats. Their intake 72, their adoptions 32, transfers 23, and microchips were 34 for the month of April. And here you're seeing pictures of a couple of those 32 adoptions that they had. APA has been doing a lot of fundraising because they, with the volume of rescue work that they do they have very high medical bills. And they're also working on their new facility getting it put together in phases. They're also anticipating to be in their new thrift store by the fall. Here's an example of a couple of the fundraisers they've done recently. Savers accepts goods by the pound, they're weighed by the pound and then so much money is given for that poundage and here you see an April check for about \$550. And they also did another one in May and their proceeds actually exceeded what they did in May. APA does every Friday what's called \$5 Friday's and they offer a raffle basket and they're able to raise money through that because people purchase the raffle.

I forgot to note that Michel Meunier is the director of APA and there she's pictured with one of the staff of Savers receiving the check that they got in April. The picture on the right is of Sue Peterson who is one of the directors of 2 Hearts 4 Paws Animal Refuge. She was actually one of the winners, the winner in April. Another photo of the wonderful support that APA is so well known in the community and people are very generous. You see a Girl Scout troop all the way from El Paso that donated items and then you see Citizens Bank staff also donated. We haven't mentioned the Pet Food Bank, but that was one of the very first programs of APA which they've continued to do for close to a decade now. And I believe that Pet Food Bank is open once a week. Here's their July fundraiser coming up, their 7th Annual Mulligans for Mutts golf tournament will be July 13th.

Broken Promises is very, very active. I think I mentioned last month that HSSNM has operated the cattery at PetSmart for well over a decade and now it has been changed to Broken Promises is now

managing the cattery. So you see a picture, I think they had three or four adoptions for the month of April and here you're seeing one of them which is Cabbie pictured on the left. Broken Promises operates a sanctuary and Janet is an example of animals that they acquire. She came from a hoarding case in Chaparral. Broken Promises does a lot of assistance work for the Animal Shelter, taking feral cats and in this case here you see a feral mom and her kittens that were pulled from the Animal Shelter. Broken Promises also has a program that is fairly new called Highway to Health. They rescue ferals whose injuries can be treated and they've helped with a number of animals in that case who would otherwise not really have much of a chance at all.

Something else that I think is very commendable that Broken Promises does, APA does, is they take care of bottle babies. I saw a picture of Rebecca, because Rebecca and I are friends on Facebook. Rebecca Stanger, one of the directors with Broken Promises, feeding there's Stella and Luna pictured on the right. And that was taken at 3 a.m. So they're commendable because not only are they up in the middle of the night but these are people that have full time jobs as well.

Cherished K-9's is also does a lot of assistance work for the shelter and Cassie is an example of. They've been doing a lot of work helping, especially animals that are pregnant or are soon to deliver. And in this case Cassie was pulled by Cherished K-9's and placed in foster. There she's actually pictured with her foster dad. Then went to Colorado and it was just shortly thereafter that Cassie delivered four healthy puppies. And they've been doing this work of being call it neo-natal, but helping with pregnant animals. They've been doing this work for well over six months now. Cherished K-9's here's a couple of pictures of some adoptions last month. Carla has told me they average two to five adoptions a month and they hold adoption promos twice a month featuring anywhere from 35 to 40 animals. And they're of course very active in transport, coordinating, and facilitating special requests as well. Like this dog here, they were, a volunteer actually saw this dog on a County road who was guarding the body of a deceased dog and they had difficulty catching the dog. So they set a trap and then were able to get that dog and take that dog in to their foster program.

UNcaged Paws and I know it gets a little confusing, Kelly Barker's programs. But it's UNcaged Paws. Tails from the Shelter, UNcaged Paws, Check the Chip, and UNcaged Paws Freedom Flight too. And this is Freedom Flight here with Dog is my Co-pilot and this was April 19th. This flight took, which Kelly coordinated and arranged out of El Paso. Joey was the only Animal Services dog that went on that flight and there are others and there were 57 came from the El Paso area. Some people drove quite a ways to bring their foster animals from out of the El Paso area. The dogs went to Idaho and the partners involved were Idaho Humane Society, Mountain Humane, and Alpine Humane Society. All of this was coordinated with the El Paso Animal Services.

Here's more on the flight. Sophie, I had her picture included here because her tag that she's wearing says "I'm a foster". And this dog as they were, Kelly said as they were working at the puzzle piece which is always more animals than they can sometimes take. That's why they would like to have a satellite location. So the animals that don't fit could go on another flight. But this dog actually got to ride with the pilot. The dog on the right.

And speaking of Check the Chip, UNcaged Paws and the Humane Society of Southern New Mexico were involved in two microchip events this past weekend with 30 microchip implants done total. And there's a breakdown of the UNcaged Paws and HSSNM. Kelly has a great program through their lost to found Facebook page. But if an animal can bypass the shelter, that animal they record those animals and those animals receive free microchips. Five of those came and got their free microchip during the weekend event.

This photo is taken at because one was, one of the microchip events was at the Farmers Market. This one here where the photo is is at Farmer's Insurance with Bruce Buchman who is the owner of the business. UNcaged Paws or Tails from the Shelter team members Kathy, Stephanie, and Denise. Then you see pictured Frank Bryce, President of the Humane Society with one of our board members standing right above him is Jeff Murphy.

Check the Chip holds their microchips the first Saturday of the month at the Farmers Market at the South end. I believe it's the second Saturday of the month, Mr. Ellins, that SHAS holds their courtesy Check the Chip, if I'm correct on that.

Safe Haven has had 10 adoptions year to date and in the left hand corner you see one of the adoptions. He has a golden retriever now as a companion. And Clover and Jackson are two littermates who were adopted together. The sanctuary capacity at Safe Haven is 45 dogs and 35 cats. Here you see some Zia Middle School students who held a donation drive for Safe Haven in April. Safe Haven is very busy with events. In addition to these promotions listed here for adoptions at PetSmart, Rudy's Country Store and Barbeque, and they were at Better Life Pet Foods recently and Farm and Ranch Heritage. They also feature some of their animals at Yappy Hour. In addition to that, we of course know that Tricia Quillen has the animal affairs Raise Your IQ with Tricia Q. Also they had their recent and very successful Wining for the Animals fundraiser. They're a very busy organization.

SNAP, they were recently awarded a \$25,000 grant from PetSmart Charities to help continue their spay and neuter work. Here are the clinics they've, two are shown here they've already held and then the next one will be May the 20th. These are photos taken of animals that were spayed and neutered at their April clinic.

Here's a picture of Rachael Snow who is the volunteer coordinator with SNAP. Here she's pictured at the Berino ACES event which APA and

the Coalition did microchipping. SNAP was there to talk about their voucher program in case anyone there was wanted to sign up their animals. There you see their numbers. They've issued year to date 712 vouchers and they've spayed and neutered 455 dogs and 257 cats. Those vouchers that have been redeemed at their clinics are 148.

Doña Ana County Humane Society has been busy with a number of events and fundraisers. This is one of them where they held a first aid for pets and there you see Dr. Calista leading the first aid class. Proceeds from that class went to the Doña Ana County Humane Societies Animal Relief Fund. Doña Ana County Humane Society was recently awarded \$7,500 grant which they are going to use for their Animal Relief Fund. Here you see an example of their Animal Relief Fund at work. This kitty on the left was diagnosed with hyperthyroidism and thankfully through the Animal Relief Fund they were able to diagnose the animal and get the medication needed. This little dog on the right actually lost his foot. He had to have that surgery and none of this would have been possible without the support of the medical assistance from the ARF fund.

Doña Ana County Humane Society, one of their other programs is Pets for Seniors. Here you see a couple of seniors who adopted pets at the, their Pets for Seniors program offering the \$50 discount is applicable for the Animal Shelter. So that is really something that's very very helpful and very much needed. Doña Ana County Human Society and SNAP cohost Yappy Hour. That's held the third Wednesday of the month, March through October at St. Clair's. Their upcoming event is called May Movie Madness.

The Dog Park Coalition is going to be holding a canine health and safety clinic on May 18th. Dr. Carver will be doing vaccinations at that event. Dr. Carver, by the way is very active in the other clinics that we've referenced before; whether they're microchipping or not, Dr. Carver is oftentimes at those events. Animal Control is going to be there for the Check the Chip and to update the registration if it's needed. This will be held at the dog park. The dog park recently held their annual meeting.

The Pet Network. The Las Cruces Pet Network is largely social media but some of it is direct distribution. We have our distribution list and so we send out notices about animals that are in need. Here's an example of a cat in need of a home. One of our very active network members has recently been hospitalized. Has been in the hospital for a while. So actually it was 2 Hearts 4 Paws that led a food drive for that individual and that's a picture of some of the donations for that food drive. That's the end of the community report. Do you have any questions?

42 Ellins:

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Any questions from the Board? Board Member Smith.

44 Smith:

Thank you Mr. Chairman. And thank you Ms. Gilbert. I am so impressed with this community and the way people step up in so many areas. But we had so many groups and that's quite a list to go through. I appreciate

you coming in with good grace each time and sharing all of that with us, because there is so much going on. Just in general thank you. Thank you Mr. Chair.

Gilbert: And I'm grateful my voice cooperated. If I remember last month, I felt like I was coughing all the way through it. Thank you very much for your time.

#### VI. Action Items

Dollahon:

#### A. Resolution 2019-05: Accept FY20 Budget

Ellins: We are now into action items. For the purpose of adopting the Fiscal Year 2020 Budget. Mr. Dollahon.

Mr. Chairman, Members of the Committee. Good morning again. Before you on the last three pages that are double sided is the proposed FY19-20 budget that needs to be adopted so it can be incorporated into the City's budget for approval and submission to the State Department of Finance and Administration by the end of this month. Starting on the first page, there's a projected expenses and the three columns are FY18 actual expenses, FY19 projected expenses. That's where we project to be with expenditure line items. And then FY20 is what is requested for next year. First shown are salary and benefits expenses. As you can see expenses are going up because of staffing and concerns, there is one significant change and that's the reduction in the use of temporary agency services. That is on there. That's because we're working really hard to maintain staffing. So that gives us an FY20 proposed budget of \$2.128 million of personnel and salary benefit expenditures.

Finishing on the next page are the operating expenses and that shows a cut down from FY2018 from 831 to 827 in FY19 and then \$700,000. That was done primarily in part to help balance the budgets with revenue. Our total operating expenses projected is \$2.828 million for FY20 which is up from the FY18 actuals but down from our FY19 projected budget.

On your next sheet are revenue expenses which includes investment income, the transfers from the City's general fund, and then associated licensing and various expenses from our outside partners; where there is the transfer from the County, expenses from Anthony, Sunland Park, Hatch. There is also pet licensing, vaccination expenses, microchipping, adoptions, return to owners, spay and neuter expenses. There are some other revenue grants that are in there; one's a carryover of a local grant and another grant.

Page, what is essentially page four is your 7441 fund which is your capital expenses. There's a \$37,000 carryover remaining grant. That is for the outside kennels. There's a \$28,000 transfer in fund from object

801. That's from your ASCMV general fund to this capital fund to complete the outside kennels project.

The last two pages are your actual fund summary examples. So for fund 7440 which is the Animal Services general fund, we have a projected beginning balance for FY20 of \$257,000. Revenues are expected to be \$1.6 million which includes the County transfer of \$1.2 million. Then there are expenditures both personnel operating and then the operating transfer out to the capital fund of \$28,000. Then there's a transfer in, that's the City's transfer in. So subtracting fund balance, plus revenue, minus expenditures, plus the transfer in from the City, that gives you a predicted ending balance of \$267,000. Then there's the required State required 1/12th reserve which is \$235,000 and that gives you a projected ending balance to the ASCMV general fund of \$31,895. That's on the first page of exhibit A. Second page of exhibit A is the capital fund 7441 which has a projected beginning balance of \$11,665. Revenues, that's the grant of \$37,000. The capital expenditure \$65,000 for the outside kennels. Then there's the transfer in from the ASCMV general fund and so we will end up with the same projected ending balance within the capital fund.

That's it for the FY20 proposed budget. We will have to look at this at end of year close and then we'll look at it again based on the audit when that occurs later in the year. We could be back to you in July, August, or September for corrections, and then again with the audit for any corrections based on that by the end of the year. The audit corrections are usually related to liability expenses and so forth or any corrections to the account summary as part of the audit. But with that Mr. Chairman, Bernice, Bryan, and I stand for questions to the extent that we can answer them.

Ellins: Board Member Smith.

31 Smith:

Thank you Mr. Chairman. Mr. Dollahon, on exhibit A, page one where you were talking about the transfer from the City, could you explain a little bit more about how that works?

3435 Dollahon:

Mr. Chairman, Members of the Committee. The transfer from the City and as required by the Joint Powers Agreement that we agreed with the County to establish ASCMV, they both transfer the same amount. So what happens from the City is we automatically transfer the \$1.25 million and the County gets billed for a corresponding amount of equal amount. And the \$1.25 million was what was agreed to starting in FY19. So we're continuing that on. What happens is the City makes its transfer monthly. The County contributes two months' worth in the month of July and then the remaining balance is billed over the remaining 11 months. That is for cash flow purposes so that we can ensure ASCMV has cash coming in from the City and the County in order to pay the bills. That two-month advance is done in July for that purpose and then the remaining balance is

1 billed out over the remaining 11 months. It is purely a cash flow 2 mechanism that contribution in the first month. 3 4 Smith: Thank you Mr. Dollahon. I guess basically then the reason that it's 5 handled differently for the City from how it is handled from the County as 6 far as how it's shown is simply because the City is the fiscal agent. Is that 7 correct? 8 9 Dollahon: Yes sir. Mr. Chairman, Board Member Smith. The City is able because we're the fiscal agent and we're able to do journal entries for those fund 10 transfers. Whereas with the County we must do a billing. 11 12 13 Smith: Thank you very much. Appreciate that. 14 And the billing terms are agreed to in the Joint Powers Agreement. So the 15 Dollahon: 16 County understands that we'll bill for two months' worth of expenditures in 17 July. 18 19 Smith: Great. Thank you Mr. Dollahon. Thank you Mr. Chairman. 20 21 Ellins: Board Member Eakman. 22 23 Eakman: Thank you Mr. Chair and thank you Mr. Dollahon. I appreciate this. First 24 question is on the first page. I was curious on how PARA will be reduced 25 in 2020 from 2019, number one, and also wondering if the workers 26 compensation there is very optimistic. 27

Dollahon:

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Mr. Chairman. I think the PARA is a performance, it's a percentage of the employee's salary. And it's based on actual expenditures and hours worked. So with vacancies you don't pay into PARA. So we're trying to be optimistic I think. The percentage of contribution by the employer on the employee's behalf I think that's probably a realistic number considering what we spent in FY18 on actuals. I think that's probably a fairly safe number.

The workers' comp expenses, that 510, is based on a formula that the employee and the employer has to pay for out of each paycheck and it's a relatively small amount. That is not actual workers' comp expenses based on accidents and the like. That is covered out of another account that is a liability account. Am I not correct Josh? Was that a shake of the head yes? Okay. So that employer expense is only for a premium to the workers' comp insurance that the employers have to pay. The employees also pay a portion out of their pocket for that workers' comp premium. So it is a very, very small amount each year. And it's the same for the ASCMV as it is for the City.

44 45 Eakman: Thank you so much. We do not have a month-by-month cash flow prediction in this budget and that's just fine with me. But I'm wondering,

just curious, are we going to be able to have a 1/12th reserve every month

during the coming year based on what we're seeing here?

Dollahon:

Mr. Chairman, I believe that has been our standard practice and I don't see that changing. We carry over that 1/12th from year after year after year. So once it was initially established, we very rarely tap into that 1/12th reserve and then we have to replenish it by the end of the fiscal year. We can tap into it, but to my knowledge we've never tapped into that 1/12th reserve for the ASCMV for an operating project, because we

already have the money there.

Eakman: I really support this projected budget you've brought forward. I'll only say

that cash flow we'll have to watch very carefully.

1617 Dollahon:

Mr. Chairman. I agree with you and we will be looking at the current FY19 budget cash flow as part of the May meeting. We will be doing that May and June and probably in July we will also have to do an end of year budget adjustment for the FY19 budget. That is common practice for the

City before we can close the FY19 books.

Eakman: Thank you Mr. Dollahon. Thank you Mr. Chair.

Further Board comments? I have a question on the revenue schedule. And I'm not sure I quite understood why the way the County contributes and the City contributes are different, but let me just note that I see revenue from Doña Ana County, City of Anthony, Sunland Park, Village of Hatch, but nothing from the City of Las Cruces.

Dollahon:

Ellins:

Mr. Chairman. I would encourage you to go up to the fifth line item on that same page. That 7440, the object is 990100 and then project is 91000 transfer from. That \$1.25 million shown on that line item on the far right that is the City's matching contribution just like the County. That is a flat agreed upon fee. We do it as a transfer here because we're your fiscal agent. That's where I was talking about we bill the County and we transfer from the City.

Ellins: Further comment. May I have a motion to adopt the resolution adopting

#### VII. PUBLIC INPUT

Ellins: Now it's time for public input. Frank come forward.

Frank Bryce, President, Humane Society of Southern New Mexico. These meetings are getting better and better folks. Lots of good news and stuff. I want to thank the shelter for what they're doing with our organization. I took a cat up there yesterday and they diagnosed it as we suspected and had to put it down. The problem that's related to it, and I'm not up here to be nitty picky, but it was a colony cat or a TNR cat that had no colony assignment. And when I got involved, it had a microchip and it went back to an address but no body responsible. I think the Task Force is working on that issue, but it does need to be resolved. When we find an injured

animal, it goes back to somebody who has responsibility for it. It had to go back to the shelter because that's where the chip was assigned and they did take it over and put the poor thing down. And a good Samaritan was nice enough to do that.

I do have a question though, that I noticed as I went in the door at the shelter, it says 'no dogs allowed' and it has a little explanation. My problem and concern, even though it seems minor at the moment, there is a law against leaving your dog in a car in Las Cruces and in that parking lot in the summer time that could present a problem. We either need to figure out how to alert the public that they can't leave their dogs in the car or do something along that order. I was hoping Gino might step up here and explain that, how that might be handled so that they, the patrons don't get in trouble for leaving a dog in a car in the heat of the summer. Not so bad in the winter and I think it's kind of, sort of as it is. Mr. Smith said last time under the radar rather than under the table. But I don't want somebody getting in trouble and I don't want a dog getting hurt because a sign on the door says 'no dogs allowed' and you got your dog there in the heat of the summer. If I could ask Gino to address that, I would appreciate it if you could. Thank you.

Jimenez:

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Mr. Chairman, Members of the Board. There is no law in our ordinance right now that is specific to leaving an animal in a vehicle. However, that section is covered under our animal cruelty section which states that if an owner of an animal allows their animal to suffer intentionally then they can be charged with cruelty to animals. When we're addressing what we call hot dogs, dogs that are left in vehicles, we are looking at the stress and the distress of that animal while it's in that vehicle. So the temperature really has nothing to do with it. It's how the dog is reacting to the heat within that car. Every one of my officers is assigned or is equipped with a laser thermometer that can read the temperature inside of the vehicles. So let's say for example, the ambient temperature outside is 85 degrees. However the temperature inside the vehicle is at 120. Then my officers will act immediately to make sure that that animal does not succumb to heat stroke or heat exhaustion.

But for what Mr. Bryce was alluding to, we don't want an animal to be left in a parked car in front of the Animal Shelter. I don't know what the policy is at the Animal Shelter right now for not allowing dogs in. Maybe that's something that just needs to be readdressed now that construction is over or something like that.

Ellins: Bernice, can you respond please?

43 Navarro:

Yes, the reason that the policy had been put in place was mainly for disease control. Since we haven't been allowing regular animals, found animals that we don't know what they may be exposed to or anything like

that. They're not entering into the building at first. It has really helped to help control the disease that comes into the shelter.

As far as leaving an animal out in the vehicle, we have added a doorbell at the front entrance. So if you go and notice the little sign on there. If there is any person who is coming in with a found animal or with their animals, anything like that, and they feel that they cannot leave the animal in the vehicle for whatever reason, they can go ahead and bring it up to the outside, if they'll just ring that bell one of our staff members is going to the front door to go and assist them in whatever way we can. So if some people, individuals they come by themselves and they don't have somebody else who can maybe hold on to the dog with them while they come in to take care of paperwork, anything like that. We do have our staff available to immediately go up to the front and to assist. So that way we can still continue with our disease control but also not to allow any animals to be out in the heat or anything in the vehicles.

Bryce:

That does answer my question to some degree. I just didn't see that it was posted large enough for me to find it and I was concerned. Because I was in the shelter with a cat for quite a while. That would've been pretty warm on an animal in the car. Thank you.

Dollahon: Mr. Chairman.

Ellins: Board Member Smith.

Dollahon: Mr. Chairman, sorry.

Ellins: I'm sorry. Mr. Dollahon.

30 Dollahon:

I would encourage that we need to post that on ASCMV's website about that practice. And I also know that the City's Public Information Office and I'll work with Gino and hopefully the County can do the same. Because it is becoming the hot time of the year that we do a public awareness campaign about both leaving your children and your pets unaccompanied in vehicles. So that is something that we've done in the past. So I'll ask Gino to do that with our Public Information Office. We have an established campaign for that. And then we should be posting that on ASCMV website as to what to do when bringing a found animal to the facility for disease prevention. I think that it's good advertisement for us and good awareness.

Ellins: Further public?

for May 31, 2019.

Attached are the unaudited financial results of the Animal Service Center for the period ending May 31, 2019, below are some observations for your consideration:

- The Statement of Net Position (page 1) shows a cash balance of \$228,693 in the General Fund. There are outstanding account receivables in the amount of \$88,776. \$88,636 is due from Dona Ana County and \$140 from the City of Sunland Park. The General Fund has \$52,604 in outstanding payroll liabilities.
- The Capital Projects Fund also on page 1 shows a cash balance of \$138,455. There are no outstanding receivables in the Capital Fund. There is a \$77,000 PetSmart Grant in Revenues Collected in Advance for the infirmary upgrades that will be completely expended in July 2019 according to Public Works. There is currently \$64, 163 encumbered towards the project.
- The Statement of Revenues and Expenditures (page 2) shows YTD operating revenues in the General Fund are \$2,629,706. YTD operating expenditures are at \$2,585,068 which results in an increase in Net Fund Balance of \$44,638.
- The Statement of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balance Budget to Actual (page 3) indicates 93.2% of budgeted revenues and 89.1% of budgeted expenditures have been recognized. The current budget parameter for this month is 91.7%.
- The Grants and Donations Schedule on page 7 provides a Life-to-Date Summary of grants and donations.





## A RESOLUTION TO ESTABLISH A FEE FOR ANIMALS SURRENDERED AT THE ANIMAL SERVICES CENTER OF THE MESILLA VALLEY.

The Animal Service Center of Mesilla Valley (ASCMV) Board of Directors is hereby informed that:

WHEREAS, under the ASCMV Joint Powers Agreement, under CONDITIONS-5-G10., the ASCMV Board is authorized to set fees and charges for services provided at the ASCMV; and

**WHEREAS**, the ASCMV currently accepts animals that have been surrendered by their owners at no cost; and

**WHEREAS**, the cost to care for and re-home pets can be hundreds of dollars for each animal, and a surrender fee would help subsidize these costs along with other fees already established by the ASCMV.

**NOW THEREFORE**, be it resolved by the Board of Directors for the Animal Service Center of the Mesilla Valley:

**(I)** 

**THAT** upon approval of the ASCMV Board, an Animal Surrender Fee will be charged for owned animals brought to the shelter and relinquished by the owner or their designee; and

**THAT** the fee amount will be included in the ASCMV fee schedule; and **THAT** all fees collected will be deposited into the ASCMV operating account.

**THAT**, ASCMV staff be hereby authorized to take any action necessary to implement the Animal Surrender Fee.
