Call to Order & Determination of Quorum 21 22 Quorum was determined. 23 24 Clint Thacker stated there were e-mail questions but they did not pertain 25 specifically to any of the agenda items. It was determined to answer these 26 questions now. ASCMV announced last week that the adoption procedures, Clint keeps track of online posts. Review of all photos online to assure that all animals 27 28 have glamor shots. Volunteers usually do much of the photos and so right now 29 with social distancing the photo quality is different than usual. 30 31 Second question, Pet of the Week is being posted on Facebook page with help of 32 Doña Ana County. They are always on there, sometimes a day or two later. 33 34 Third question, state managed social distancing guidelines and the modification of 35 the Shelter's hours calls for creative ways for the public to get involved with fostering and adopting. Comparison was made with El Paso Facebook page and 36 that they put videos and pictures and asked for fosters of which they got over 400. 37 As of April 10 they have 1,200 animals in foster homes. El Paso Shelter has virtual 38 39 and home delivery adoption and foster counseling as well as pet reclaims. Citizen 40 is disappointed in ASCMV social media presence as feels there is no presence 41 and no community engagement. Clint stated to compare us to El Paso is not apples to apples including a much larger budget, include a singular person for their 42 43 media. ASCMV is getting plenty of help. 44 45 Fourth question, in 2019 El Paso Fire Department started offering free chip scans of pets, this is an excellent service. Clint has spoken with the Las Cruces Fire 46

Department several times about this and it is an issue of having the correct chip and then what to do with the chip information afterwards. Scanners are \$750-800 each. Funding is an issue, also a lot of what-ifs about the coordination of animals and people.

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Fifth question, person monitors Las Cruces Lost and Found Facebook page and saw that two cats were caught by Animal Control and brought to the shelter and were thought to be feral and when owners came to reclaim they were told they were euthanized. Thought the shelter was supposed to hold an animal that has no chip or tag for three days to give the owner a chance to reclaim them. Why euthanize a cat the first day? Clint stated they were City cats and the Animal Ordinance of the City specifically states if it is a feral cat and there is overcrowding at the Shelter, the animal can be euthanized prior to the three-day hold coming up. Clint is not sure of this instance specifically.

Sixth question, there are two links on the ASCMV page under the heading Lost and Found Information. One was for Dog'Cruces which works, the other is for Lost and Found Pets Las Cruces which upon clicking on the link takes me to a page which is unavailable, please fix. Clint will look into and get it fixed.

### II. Review of the proposed ASCMV FY2021 Budget

Clint Thacker proceeded with the presentation. This is the third work session. First the layout of the organization, adding Operations Manager, but changing some of the other titles. Operations Manager; Medical Director; Administrative Service Manager which is Bernice; Admin Support Assistant, three of these. Authorized number of employees, how many positions filled, and how many are full time and part time, and current vacancy. Medical Director has 11 positions, all full time, eight filled, vacancy of three. Operations Manager, new position, 37 positions, 27 full time, 10 part time, vacancy of 6. Animal Services Manager, Bernice, 14 employees, nine full time, five part time, four vacancies. Vacancy rate estimated to help with budget. Only one true new position, but remainder are reclassifications.

Change \$2.8 million operating revenue to \$4 million revenue, 42.4% increase.

 Board Member Sanchez asked if it would be possible to utilize the City's grant personnel instead of ASCMV having their own grant writer. Clint has been told the grant writers on staff at the City will only help find grants, not help write them. Board Member Dollahon stated ASCMV could piggyback on the City contract with an outside firm. But Insight may not be the most effective tool as they are more involved in bigger money grants.

Board Member Gandara stated Insight has been helpful to focus and build capacity and larger funding streams. Still feels a grant writer specific to the ASCMV is most impactful. Chairperson Flores was in agreement.

Board Member Gonzalez asked about the salary for a Grant Writer. Clint Thacker stated approximately \$30,000 for a full time position, plus benefits.

Clint Thacker said 74% increase on vaccinations due to the clinics. Microchips they plan to decrease by 24%, but the vaccine clinics also offer microchipping. Onsite adoptions up 9%. Spay and neuter decreased 26%, are requesting another veterinarian, but no recovery space. Goal to ultimately open up to public after the new center is built and well organized. Animal Shelter Services go down 36%, dead animal disposal, owner surrender euthanasias, and owner surrenders. Doña Ana County support, asking for increase of 48% and same amount from the City. JPA states the City and County are required to provide fiscally equally. City of Anthony, Sunland Park, and Village of Hatch, fees get via impounding. Donations and memorials are a trending up. Other revenues.

Mike Fuchini introduced revenues from City and County from \$1.25 million to \$1.86 million and with addition of the center contributing \$336,000 total \$4.1 million.

Board Member Sanchez mentioned that due to unknown GRT totals, County has been requested to submit this year's budget for next year's budget. Concerns County having in supporting such a large increase, or any increase at the moment. Clint Thacker states that the according to the JPA the City and County are required to input the same amount financially. In that aspect, if City or County could not do the increase, it would change the entire budget and how the Center moves forward. There has to be change due to shortfall of budget for the positions not being funded. Detrimental to the Center. Board Member Sanchez stated it has not been decided by the Commission yet, but discussion is leaning that direction due to deadlines to submit to DFA (Department of Finance and Administration). Chairperson Flores expressed concern that the County may not be able to contribute the new amount. Board Member Sanchez stated this came to play due to the COVID-19 and not having a good understanding of how GRT will affect revenues. It was determined that City, County, and ASCMV are all on the same fiscal year of July 1 through June 30.

Board Member Dollahon stated there was some guidance issued by the State. A flat budget is allowed by State law. The City is proceeding based on estimates they have. County has a little different timing; budget is July 1 to June 30. State has municipalities submit budgets before the counties and so County is not approved until almost August, though City is around the first of July. An option available is making a request to increase the budget but holding a flatline budget starting July 1 and come into the first quarter and then request the City and the County to review and evaluate an increase proportionally to each other. Revisions can be made at a later date. Board Member Sanchez recommended to continue with the conversation with this presentation as is. County will broach subject at a later date.

Board Member Gandara wanted to go back to return to owners slide due to needing further information on DAC RTO, and CLC RTO. Clint stated one went up and one down but does not know the exact reason of 50% increase for the county and 10% drop for the City of people coming and getting the animals. The budget was developed in this area according to the trend. Board Member Dollahon stated that the Animal Control Officers charge a fee in the field for this. The ASCMV amended the return to owner fee. Board Member Gandara stated this is a fee for when people come to pick up their animal and Animal Control. Clint stated this is only animals being redeemed by their owners at the Center. Board Member Gandara asked to make the definitions more similar to be able to compare better. Clint stated that conversation would need to be with the ACO supervisors. Board Member Dollahon stated there are operational differences between City and County ACO for good reasons. Clint Thacker asked as he is half done, but if the funding is not going to be there

to do this should they just come back with revised budget. Have to do this as positions are unfunded. Board Member Gandara mentioned a 20% decrease in GRT in September. She suggests a meeting with management/administration with City and County to see. Board Member Dollahon stated hoping this was adopted at the April 23rd meeting. City needs the ASCMV budget by mid May at the latest. Have Clint look at his absolute needs are, where he can cut, and where he can add.

Clint Thacker mentioned in going forward is the same information in the budget as the first meeting. The budget will be further explored with the ASCMV Finance Committee. Board Member Dollahon suggested put the budget resolution on the agenda for next week, and table it if necessary.

38			William Lawrence, Senior Animal Control Officer for Doña Ana County gave
39			the County ACO report. March 2020, picked up a total of 188 animals, 158
40			went to the Animal Service Center which included 10 owner release dogs,
41			two owner release cats, 77 stray dogs, 35 stray cats, six care and welfare
42			holds, 17 injured animals, three miscellaneous holds, and eight rabies
43			quarantines at the Shelter and 11 County court hold facility. No livestock,
44			two snakes, 17 dead animals. Reason for owner releases in the field were:
45			Three for aggressive behavior, two moving out of town or could not keep
46			their animals, one dog and one cat. Sick, injured, and dying owner releases

were four. One gave the answer they could no longer care for the animal. In the field return to owner were 33 for February. Scanned 185 animals with a total of 41 microchips. Responded to 652 calls: 43 injured, 12 cruelty, 42 vicious, 24 bites. Filed, educated, compliance on 20 licensing/microchips, 38 permits, 35 rabies vaccinations, 52 care and maintenance. Court cases were 17, 39 charges resulting in 90.5 regular hours and 32.5 overtime. Three warrants issued, nine guilty pleas, and total donations of \$100. Fourteen dismissed for compliance, 13 continuance.

Board Member Gonzalez asked about the overtime and if there are not enough people in the field. William Lawrence stated it is not necessarily that there are not enough people in the field, just means that the court date fell on officer's day off, therefore we of course have to be on there that day.

Mary Lou Ward, Doña Ana County Animal Control and Code Supervisor added to the report March and April and probably into May see some of the numbers be lower because of the COVID-19 and the response for the officers since only responding to emergency type calls, sick or injured animals, vicious and/or dangerous animals. Not going out for regular stray animals, not impounding those type of animals at the Shelter. Trying to educate people to keep animals and find owners for them. All outreach programs halted.

Chairperson Flores asked if an account of these animals was being kept. Mary Lou Ward stated that would be Central Dispatch. Chairperson Flores requested those numbers for next month.

Board Member Gandara had questions on the three miscellaneous holds, the eight, what that entails. Mary Lou Ward stated there was a care and maintenance hold, injured animals, stray, and it could be cruelty hold or waiting for someone to come into compliance on some other type of violation. Board Member Gandara also asked about the rabies and if they are part of the 11. Mary Lou Ward stated those are separate, the eight are at the shelter due to no owner. If an animal bites someone and does not have an owner it will quarantine at the shelter due to County facility is not open to the public to find their animal. The other 11 quarantined at the County facility, have an owner. Board Member Gandara was concerned about the rabies. Mary Lou Ward stated it is state statute if an animal bites someone it is a rabies quarantine. This is observing the animal to be sure they do not have rabies. At the end of the quarantine animals all get rabies vaccination before returning to the owner.

Gino Jimenez Animal Control Supervisor for the City of Las Cruces. March 2020 responded to 414 stray calls, 239 GOA (gone on arrival), 175 apprehended, 144 impounded at the Shelter of those 78 were dogs and 67 cats. Successful in field RTO 30 animals and unsuccessful in 14 and those

went to the Shelter. The three year comparison, of course types of calls presently responding changed and therefore decrease. Field RTO for the year is 90, 34 last month. Reasons for owner release, dogs showing aggression, but doing some education but still impound animals that are a threat to the community or to family members. The 14 reasons unable to field RTO, no contact by phone or at the residence; one was from Sunland Park, which is obviously out of Las Cruces jurisdiction, another the owner no longer lived at that address, and other 12 were unable to contact at home or phone.

Board Member Gandara requested the maps of stray animal pickup be available and interactive. Gino has requested this but not possible due to GIS issues. Board Member Dollahon sated he will have a meeting with Gino and GIS staff.

Gino Jimenez stated the City ACO is still picking up stray animals for anything considered a public safety issue. Permitting has been suspended temporarily.

Board Member Abeyta-Stuve asked if aggressive animals can be rehabilitated. Gino stated that it is in the hands of the Animal Service Center. Board Member Abeyta-Stuve then pursued the question with Clint Thacker. Clint stated it is a case-by-case basis.

Board Member Gandara asked about the animal that was from Sunland Park and how that could be handled. Gino stated they only have jurisdiction within the City and liability issues. Board Member Gandara also asked about the 14 unsuccessful attempts and wanting reasons for that. Gino pointed out the previous screen, and except for the two mentioned, the others, the officer tries calling and goes to the address to field RTO.

Board Member Sanchez asked if contact was made with the Sunland Parker owner Gino stated they were unable to make contact by phone and with the Sunland Park address, so jurisdiction boundaries, animal was impounded at the Center. People need to be sure to update microchip information if they move.

### B. Shelter Statistics and Activities

Clint Thacker animal count in the shelter 197 compared to 2019 at 492. Intake at 528. Outcomes, adoptions, rescues, everything in line. Community cats are a lot lower as no longer participating in community cats in the City. Euthanasia higher in 2020 for March mainly because of not participating with community cats. Live release rate 87.1%, 92.7% in 2019. March surgeries are 185. Visitors in March were 1,951, compared to 2019 at 2,430.

### C. Committee Reports

### 1. Finance - David Dollahon, Committee Chair

Board Member Dollahon stated there was a committee meeting this week. This included Board Member Abeyta-Stuve, Board Member Sanchez, Clint Thacker, City Staff, and County Manager Macias. County Manager Macias joined related to the budget.

Amador Espinoza gave the financial report for statement ending March 31. Cash \$247,000, receivables \$91,000 and \$88,000 of that is due from Doña Ana County, \$2,000 from City of Anthony, \$280 from Sunland Park. Liabilities \$66,000 and \$4,000 is due to venders which will be paid in April, \$61,000 is payroll, and \$505 remaining of Best Friends grant. Unassigned fund balance \$271,000. Restricted cash balance \$3,600. Total revues for March \$2,166,000 and total expenditures \$1,195,000. Net change of \$93,330 after transfers. Budget parameter for March 75%. Total aggregate revenues at 75.6%, total expenditures at 70.4%. Expenditures, temporary services 88.7%, purchase services 79.6% which are medical supplies. Revenues and expenditures graph shared. Another graph shows percentage of total expenditures.

Clint Thacker discussed temporary workers mentioned by Amador Espinoza and that there is currently a hiring freeze, and no temporary workers are at the Center for the last month.

Board Member Abeyta-Stuve stated in the committee meeting it was discussed and happened last year, uncollected administration fees. Amador Espinoza stated that that is the administrative fee that the City of Las Cruces charges the Animal Service. During FY19 those administrative fees were waived and also waived for FY20. That increased net change in fund balance. These are for upkeep of the general ledger, running payrolls, posting cash receipts, writing of financial statements, dealing with auditors. This will be included in FY21 budget. Board Member Dollahon added that this also covers IT support and Human Resources support.

Board Member Dollahon continued with the financial report. Some discussion about following up with Sunland Park and Anthony on the billings. Re-review the budget on revenues and operating expenses.

Chairperson Flores asked the proposed budget is going to be looked at again by the Finance Committee. Board Member

 Dollahon explained that it was looked at this week at the work session and is an action item on this agenda.

### 2. Executive - Yvonne Flores, Committee Chair

Chairperson Flores stated nothing to report.

### 3. Facilities - Kassandra Gandara, Committee Chair

Board Member Gandara stated nothing to report.

Clint Thacker stated a current HVAC project is in process. It has had some weather delays. There are some issues with the units ordered in that the intake needed to be on the side and is on the back. Things are being worked out. Believe roof and HVAC to be completed by July.

### D. CfPP Report

Jean Gilbert gave the CfPP report. She met with Laura Connor, SHAS director in February, and 2 Hearts 4 Paws in March. Showed some of the expenses that local groups incur for medical treatment of animals they are helping. APA had 32 transfers for February. Majority of APA cats are from the Shelter. Intake was 27 with 55 adoptions for those months. Broken Promises spay and neuter costs over \$19,000 last year. Cat's Meow amazing adoptions for February, and last year 124 adoptions, with 70 transports. Cherished K-9 rescued 469 dogs in 2019, 128 adoptions. They received \$52,500 grant from PetSmart charities to increase affordable veterinary care act. Humane Society of Southern New Mexico holding adoption promotions second Saturday of the month at PetSmart, but currently suspended. They have adopted three cats and about seven dogs. SNAP issued 463 spay/neuter vouchers for January and February.

Board Member Abeyta-Stuve asked if the non-profits are seeing a lot more intakes. Jean Gilbert said there is an increase in requests for intake and trying to find more fosters.

### V. Action Items

A. Resolution 2020-10 - Adopt New Leave and Work Policies Regarding Emergency Paid Sick Leave and Emergency Family and Medical Leave Expansion

Clint Thacker stated this is a continuation of the Federal laws that changed and this is to adopt these.

Board Member Dollahon stated these were mandated under Families First Response to COVID Act that went into effect April 2nd and this is in addition to what was adopted as extraordinary leave and guarantine leave. Extraordinary leave remains in place. Quarantine leave is suspended because these two, one is an emergency sick leave act for that end up being quarantined as a direct result of COVID. And the other one is an extension of the Family and Medical Leave Act, specifically related to childcare, not related to a health incident. Emergency sick leave is for two weeks related to essentially the quarantine. Extended Family Medical Leave is 10 weeks after a two wee period and there is a special process related to this.

Motion by Board Member Sanchez, second by Board Member Gandara. Passed unanimously.

### B. Resolution 2020-11 - Contract Piggyback for MWI Veterinary Supply **Company dba MWI Animal Health**

Motion by Board Member Gonzales, second by Board Member Ellins. Passed unanimously.

### C. Resolution 2020-12 - Adopt the ASCMV FY2021 Annual Budget

Clint Thacker stated the County wanted a straight roll over from this year's budget to next year's budget and because JPA shows City and County have to be the same, City will follow suit. Changes to make the new budget work, not getting an Operations Manager. Keep the Account Supervisor under the Director, exactly how it is now, Assistant Account Supervisor etc. Currently 11 vacant positions and they will not be filled at this time. Intake of strays and spay and neuter surgeries will need some additional personnel. There are some position changes; veterinary assistant with new title of veterinarian technician; assistant kennel supervisor currently vacant and Curtis will be filling in that; administrations operation's manager which is Bernice, change her title to admin services manager.

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Operating revenue shows a 0.4% decrease for the new budget year. Vaccinations some money to possibly do spay/neuter clinic but if we do those then need to find money from other places, that is why 174% increase. These were all done by trend. The Doña Ana County support will stay at \$1.25 million, just like it was this year. The City of Las Cruces will stay the same at \$1.25 million. City Anthony, Sunland Park, and Village of hatch keeping the same expecting the same impounds coming from them. No large changes as far a revenue.

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Operation expenses shows only a 0.3% increase but comes at a significant cost. Operating cost changes, admin salaries decreasing 29%, \$372,000. That includes percentage raise for Director, and deferred raise for Director,

and operations management where that salary was. Classified employees looking at going up because we added part time regular \$40,000 only one employee don't know why classification is part time regular, so going up into classified. Contract employees, those are veterinarians so less veterinarian time so less surgeries, so that is cut by 23%. Stand-by pay has not been done before, that is why there is a zero in Fiscal Year 2020. This is because the Center has had managers coming in after hours and euthanizing for Animal Control Officers when they get an injured or sick animal. Staff at the Center is able to bear that load so they will be paid via stand-by pay to be on call. Scheduled overtime decreased by 43%, scraping the barrel on that. Medicare, Social Security, and PARA no control, so those are the same. Same with pension, dental, health, workers' comp. Cell phone and vehicle allowance Director gets and some employees get. Reason it is zero in FY20 it was not tracked as own line item. Temp agency services, the reason that is a zero because it was in personnel and so dropped it down into operations costs for \$25,900. Safety supplies first aid kit at the Center. Shop supplies for building maintenance supervisor. Uniforms increased. Membership dues own line item for better tracking. Professional technical services cut by 68% because it was one of the larger funds, and no veterinarian, therefore less surgeries. Therefore not opening up for public spay and neuter. Temp agency services changed to zero because moved up into personnel. Vehicle maintenance, van died at the beginning of April, so older vehicles are going to need maintenance. Vehicle tires tubes now being tracked. Building rental is for storage facility, not tracked before. Travel cut by 64%, that money is already spent because veterinarian technician needs continuing education and also veterinarian that needs continuing education credits and that just to keep licenses and certificates. Transportation is rescues and is cut by 23%. Paul requested one less employee and increase transportation. Transportation is top way to get animals out.

The reason the budget is cut so much because of COVID-19. People not going out, not spending money which means taxes not being collected by the businesses. Removed all team building, training budget, reduced overtime, reduced contract employees by 50%, reduced temporary agency services by 50%, reduced overall supplies by 50%, removed all awards programs to recognize staff, reduced medical supplies, reduced purchase services, removed major equipment budget, reduced all travel, and reduced overall advertising budget. Funding may be insufficient to support a reasonable transition into FY22 and the addition to the center, i.e. the new building. Not going in looking positive for that. Finishing the building will be paid for, but the transition into it was going to be very, very difficult with this budget.

Board Member Gandara thinks the grant writer position is necessary and that can't afford not to have a grant writer. She doesn't agree with reducing funding around team building and travel. Administrative cost at \$111,000,

what is that percentage of giving to the City. Clint Thacker said the administrative fee has been a percentage. Board Member Dollahon stated it is driven by the JPA and it works out to just under 4%. In FY19 it was excluded to balance the books at the end of the year and authorized through Council action to not collect it this current fiscal year, FY20. Per the JPA needs to be paid. Clint stated his budget show 17.7% of the budget so what is the 4%. The \$111,000 is across the entire budget including personnel. Board Member Gandara asks that one of the vacancies be a grant writer.

Board Member Dollahon is there an estimate of the position Paul asked to not acquire and replace with transportation. Clint doesn't think it is a vacant position, but when it is vacated or if somebody does leave that money would move. The Board action can move money from personnel to operations. Board Member Dollahon said within the current budget there is no way for a grant writer but within next year's budget always an opportunity. Other option would be from the City Council, City could contrary to the JPA provide more money than the County can, decision of the full City Council. The councilors needs to inform the City managers that they would like that reflected in the budget and then appropriately incorporated within the adoption of the City's budget at the May 18th meeting.

Board Member Gandara also asked about the van. Clint Thacker stated it is being worked on by City fleet. Board Member Gandara also mentioned the new facility and the County's portion and have there been discussions. Board Member Dollahon the dialogue has started.

Mary Lou Ward had a question about the budget. She did not see donations that are recorded every month and would like to see some type of reporting on donations going into the Center and categorize on how they are coming in. Board Member Dollahon politely disagreed as Clint brought up the screen of the donations and memorials and is on the monthly report.

Board Member Sanchez appreciates the work Clint put into the budget. Clint Thacker stated the whole industry of animal care and control has been flipped upside down because of the pandemic.

Chairperson Flores stated Board Member Gandara expressed very well and Chair's concerns are the same. We need a grant writer and a veterinarian. Team building is very important. Clint Thacker stated there are 11 vacant positions at the Center. Have the funds but those funds are paying for positions that were not funded. Clint stated with a new veterinarian it would take two to three positions as at least \$100,000 not including reeducation/certifications. If more surgeries, then more recovery area, more supplies, more techs, snowball effect of needs. Board Member Dollahon asked how long would it take to hire an on-staff veterinarian.

Motion to direct staff to move funding to accommodate the positions of a grant writer and a veterinarian to the budget by Board Member Gandara, second by Board Member Abeyta-Stuve. Passed unanimously.

Main motion by Board Member Gandara, second by Board Member Sanchez. Passed unanimously.

### VI. PUBLIC INPUT

Clint Thacker stated two e-mails have come in prior to the meeting but none during the meeting.

Board Member Gandara believes it is important to have public comment.

Board Member Dollahon recommended Clint Thacker read the comments today and if in a position to answer but if not then follow-up next meeting.

Clint Thacker read the e-mails, first from Emily Stanford a volunteer as dog walker and off-site caretaker at the ASCMV. She states staff members have always been polite and helpful, felt welcomed and no negative comments or experiences regarding interactions with Center workers. Animals are cared for, feeding, and shown compassion and affection. The volunteer coordinator is great. Wonderful to be able to take large dogs out back and off leash and allow for more exercise. The new renovations to the cat room are excellent. An excellent idea to play soft music for the dogs, it seems to calm then down a bit. The kennels seem small and she has seen kennel mates fighting, and not enough space to get away. Dogs do not have enough space to move around and many become aggressive with each other as a result. Have seen banging on the doors or loud noises to silence barking dogs and she felt distressed by this as it could only heighten the anxiety of the dogs. She has seen occasional disregard for the feelings of the animals. She has worked at Petco and any issues or ill animals were addressed immediately. Although some cats are at an off-site location without full information, including age, gender, help, name, etc. Suggests more off-site events as they seem to be helpful. Biggest problem is minimal space for animals, lack of space for dogs leads to aggressive behavior and anxious, frightened dogs. Grateful to the staff.

Clint Thacker proceeded to address the above e-mail. Staff has been trained by a well known dog trainer in the area that when dogs fight to use loud noises to disrupt that fight. Worse case scenario to spray a hose, (inaudible), grab the back of the legs, throw a blank, are all mentioned and it is progressive. Spraying of dogs due to barking, not acceptable. The fighting, some food aggression, issues of dog being ultra dominant. Clint stated more training will be in place especially for spraying a dog due to barking is unacceptable. Cats going to off-site with no information. That is just an oversight but there is a person that that is their job.

Clint Thacker proceeded to read e-mail from Cindy Eck. What areas need the most work? Vet your resources. Make them (inaudible) if they are pulling from ASCMV. Example canine 6 is (inaudible) of parvo reinfection. Stick with the ones who actually know what they are doing. What has been done in the past that you have found successful that we should be doing more of? Social videos really work as far as pulling on the heartstrings of those who saw and have the opportunity to pull pets. How can we make communication better between fosters, adopters, volunteers, and shelter workers? She thinks things are working. VII. CHAIR AND BOARD COMMENTS Board Member Gandara appreciate diligence to Clint and staff. She, Chairperson Flores, and Board Member Ellins received an e-mail about an animal being really sick and being adopted and alluded to not caring for the animal. Appreciate all the treatment for the animal. Board Member Sanchez appreciates all that Clint Thacker and his team done over the past year. Board Member Abeyta-Stuve everything answered. The public should be aware when they are adopting or fostering push to adopt, but public be mindful these are long-term animals. Chairperson Flores thanks everyone on the Board and all contributors to today's meeting. VIII. Attached is the unaudited financial report of the Animal Service Center of the Mesilla Valley for the period ending April 30, 2020. Below are some observations for your consideration:

- The General Fund Statement of Net Position (page 1) shows cash of \$263,213. Accounts receivable balance is \$4,180 which includes \$4,040 due from the City of Anthony for animal intakes and \$140 due from the City of Sunland Park. Outstanding payroll liabilities are \$61,719. The Unassigned Fund balance is \$205,674. The Capital Projects Fund shows a restricted fund balance of \$3,565 for the Stern Cat Room Donation.
- The Statement of Revenues and Expenditures (page 2) shows YTD operating revenues in the General Fund are \$2,352,886. YTD operating expenditures are at \$2,247,482, which results in an increase in Net Fund Balance of \$27,904 after transfers.
- The Statement of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balance Budget to Actual (page 3) indicates 81.4% of budgeted revenues and 79.3% of budgeted expenditures have been recognized. The budget parameter for the month is 83.3%.
- $\bullet$  Due to not being fully staffed temporary services is at 99.9% of budget. Insurance is at 92.3% of budget due to the 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter payment to the New Mexico Department of Workforce Solutions. All other expenditures in the General Fund are within the budget guideline.
- The Grants and Donations Schedule on page 7 provides a summary of grants and donations received.

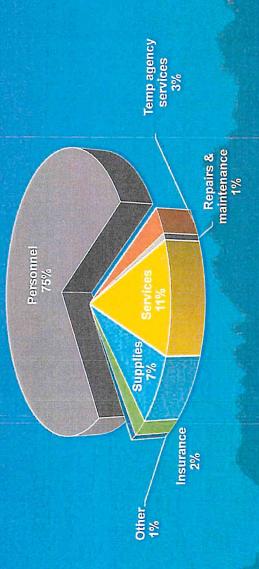






# % of Total Expenditures
