36 37 38 39 40 41			Clint Thacker introduced Bob Longmire of Public Sector Personnel Consultants who performed the study requested regarding where ASCMV salaries fall in relation to other public entities. Mr. Longmire has already presented his study to the Finance Committee and now will present for the full Board.						
42 43 44 45 46			Bob Longmire reported the results of the compensation study. He has performed studies for cities in California and Texas as well as Las Cruces. The study is to help recruit and retain personnel. ASCMV's existing salary schedule is out of date. There are more open jobs than there are people						

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applying for them. Mr. Longmire studied the list of similar services in the state, then added more from the area and in Texas to compare ASCMV's salary schedule to the market. ASCMV's actual payroll data is not as behind as the salary schedule. The schedule is on average 28% behind Mr. Longmire recommends using the City's new salary schedule as the framework for ASCMV's schedule and add the jobs to it according to the midpoints of the market ranges. Existing employees should move through the new ranges at the same pace as the City is using for their employees. He recommended that the entire payroll should receive at least a 4% increase. Following all these suggestions should raise payroll by roughly \$150,000 overall. He reminded the Board that clear communication with employees is very important so that they do not feel undervalued. Regular COLA increases is very important to keep the salary schedule even with the market. Mr. Longmire suggested calculating the ASCMV employees' COLA by averaging the amounts from the City and County every year.

Currently half of the employees have less than two years on staff. These are the caregivers and other low-paid employees; ASCMV recently raised their salary and this seems to be helping with retention rates. The average employee has 3.9 years.

This study will be used to bring recommendations before the Board starting in this budget year and carrying on into the next.

#### 5.2 City and County ACO Reports - City and County Animal Control:

Bryan Hulsey reported on December 2023 with 305 reported stray animals. 174 were picked up which included 25 cats and 149 dogs. This included 10 sick/injured with two cats and eight dogs. There were 24 owner surrenders which were all dogs. A four-year comparison was shown. A four-year return to owner comparison was shown. This December there were 39 animals field returned to owners. Additional animals picked up were: No owner surrender cats, 24 owner surrender dogs, 10 sick/injured animals, 6 welfare hold animals, and no cruelty cases. There were seven shelter quarantines and three home quarantines. There are three dogs in live evidence awaiting court. There were no rabies submissions. There were 17 diverted intakes. There were 472 education and the total calls was 731 for December 2023. The breakdown per district was shown. Reasons for owner release: Six dogs were from owners who could not take care of them; two were aggressive; two were sick/old/injured; five were vicious or involved in livestock attacks; two were unable to be kept on the property; seven of them the owners were unable to handle. Totals for the end of year 2023: Stray calls 3,421; stray cats picked up 216; stray dogs picked up 613; field Return to Owners 314; total calls of service 8,832.

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Gino Jimenez reported the City's numbers for December 2023. There were 477 stray calls; 213 gone on arrival; 264 apprehended; 205 were impounded at ASCMV; 152 were dogs and 53 were cats. Successful field RTO 59 animals and 18 were unsuccessful attempts to RTO. These animals had some sort of identification but ACOs were unable to get some of them back to their owners. This made a total of 77 identifiable animals. Grand total of stray calls for 2023 after including the December totals was 6,026. The Peak Performance report shows that this month City ACOs fell a bit short of their goal of 65% minimum secured animals with a total of 61.2%. Three-year field RTO comparison shows a grand total of 564 successful this year. The Peak Performance goal is 25% of all strays captured; this month ACOs achieved 15.2%. The community cat program totals: ACOs responded to 43 cats in traps with eight already marked. This brings numbers up to 737 trap calls and 136 community cats released. Reasons for owner surrendering animals: Four were for health issues; two were euthanasia requests; four dogs the owners could not keep in the yard; three dogs the owners had too many; three dogs for aggression; three dogs the owners could no longer afford to care for them; three cats the owner was evicted and no longer able to care for them; two dogs the housing would not allow on their property; three cats for health issues and they could not afford veterinary care; one dog euthanized for old age; one dog injured in a dog fight; one dog's owner was in the hospital and could no longer care for it; and one cat's owner was moving and could not take it along. Reasons unable to field RTO: All 18 had no contact by phone or at the residence. Peak Performance measures not previously discussed: 10% reduction of stray animal bite responses was not met, as there was a 7.3% increase in stray animal bite with 136 this year versus last year's 126; 10% reduction in owner victim bites was also not met, with 7.3% increase with 95 in 2023 versus 88 in 2022. Total calls for the month are 1,007 bringing the year total to 13,962. Three ACOs participated in the yearly Shop with a Cop program at the Walton Walmart. All ACOs attended four hours of traffic control training so they can help keep people safe at accidents if they arrive before the police.

#### 5.3 **Shelter Statistics/Activities:**

Clint Thacker reported the December 2023 numbers. Population at the Center was 348. Intake was 756 animals with 570 dogs and 169 cats. Intake methods: ACOs brought in 53% with 402; strays by public 19%; owner surrender 18%. December returns after adoptions were 13 animals; five of those dogs had behavior problems. December and January tend to have higher return rates due to pets being adopted as gifts and the recipient refuses the animal. Diverted intake numbers shown. Outcomes: 28% were adopted; reclaims were 17.5%; rescued was 24%; 47 were community cats; 31.5% were euthanized; so the live release

rate was 71%. Mr. Thacker thanked the rescues taking pets out and showed the transfer statistics. Euthanasia reasons in December include space/behavior for dogs since there is nowhere to keep and train them; aggression for dogs; for cats it is mostly for respiratory signs; again, there is nowhere to hospitalize them. The surgery team has done 4,026 surgeries up to December. The 179 volunteers did 609 hours this December. The dog walking team and cat team are amazing. Visitors were 1,634. People came in to see the new Center as well as see the animals. Website views at 35,522. Facebook views were 18,764. People really enjoy any photos of Sir Henry the Lobby Cat, and views shoot up whenever he is posted. Facebook events and the Dona Ana County partnership with Home for the Holidays were pushed in December. Upcoming events include adoptions at Village Hardware on February 3; adoptions at Petco on February 10; adoptions at PetSmart on February 17; and adoptions at Tractor Supply on February 24. The ASCMV drive-through vaccination clinic will be on February 25; free microchips will be provided and staff is seeking sponsorships to be able to provide free vaccines. Pets of the week are Jackie and Percy.

Mr. Thacker explained that the new Center was never intended to replace the old Center. The new Center was always intended to enhance the visitors' experience when coming to adopt a pet. The old Center was intended to become the medical facility. There are currently adoptable animals in both Centers due to the fact that the current stage is in transition. Visitors can request the animal they want to see at the new Center and it will be brought up if it is kenneled in the old Center. Mr. Thacker asked staff and volunteers to come up with ideas to help get the animals seen more. One volunteer suggested having the volunteers host tours of both Centers. This will take the burden off of staff who need to do other jobs. The Kennel Supervisor is slowly starting to empty the kennels in the old Center except for aggressive animal holds.

32335.4 Committee Reports

Finance - Barbara Bencomo, Committee Chair: Chair Bencomo reminded the Board that the Finance Committee meetings are held alternately at City Hall and the ASCMV. The Committee went over the compensation study from Bob Longmire and discussed implementation issues, timing, proposals, and options. Accounting provided the quarterly report and Michael Fuccini analyzed the numbers and went over it with the Committee. The Joint Powers Agreement went to Department of Finance and Administration Legal at the State about three weeks ago. Ms. Bencomo planned to request an update. She suggested that the Executive Committee have a discussion related to transitioning to the new JPA in order to be prepared for when that is approved and implemented. Ms. Bencomo has started working with the City Land Management Department

to develop a lease between the City and ASCMV for the use of facilities, as the JPA calls for it.

Michael Fuccini reported the financials as of December 31, 2023. Statement of Net Position: General Fund has cash \$1.295 million; no receivables; accounts payable negative \$6,232; liabilities and revenues collected in advance with unassigned balance of \$965,000 bringing the total liabilities in fund balance equal to the cash available. Contributions from both County and City \$1.176 million, other revenue \$192,1000 bringing the total to \$2.545 million. Expenditures were \$1.8 million. Actual totals compared to budget showed slightly higher revenues and slightly lower expenditures. Revenues tend to be higher at the beginning of the fiscal year and expenditures tend to be higher in the middle.

**Executive – Manuel Sanchez, Committee Chair:** Manuel Sanchez is not here and Chair Corran had nothing to report.

Facilities - Kasandra Gandara, Committee Chair: Kasandra Gandara has left the ASCMV Board, so a new chair needs to be chosen. Clint Thacker reported that he and Marylou Ward met to discuss issues at the Center. They are working with Baca Fence to see about the tops of the kennels. They have given a great price and are working to become vendors with the City so they can finish those kennels. The new washers and dryers have developed issues and there are strenuous discussions with the contractors regarding the installation. However, overall Mr. Thacker is pleased with the contractors' response whenever a warranty issue throughout the building pops up.

#### 6. DISCUSSION ITEMS:

#### 6.1 Election of Officers:

It was suggested to postpone/table election of officers as when the JPA is approved, it is anticipated that the Board will be completely restructured. After that, election of officers would be more appropriate.

Motion to table by Board Member Macias, second by Board Member Graham. Motion passed.

#### **6.2 Committee Members Appointments:**

Chair Corran indicated that she expected the JPA to restructure the committees as well, but until that time committee members are needed. Board Member Schaljo-Hernandez volunteered to join the Executive Committee. Board Member Graham volunteered to join the Finance Committee.

**6.3 February Meeting Date/Time:** Thursday, February 22, 2024. This meeting room will be unavailable at 9:00 a.m. and so the alternative venue will be researched and Board Members will be notified.

#### 7. ACTION ITEMS:

7.1 Resolution 2024-01: A Resolution to accept a \$42,420 award from the State of NM Animal Care and Facility Fund for spay and neuter services and to adjust the adopted FY24 budget:

Clint Thacker discussed the grant. The Board Members' packet included the information. This money will be used for spay and neutering, primarily for feral cats.

Motion by Board Member Graham, second by Board Member Macias. Motion passed.

#### 8. PUBLIC INPUT:

Kathy Stark, Member of the Public asked for clarification regarding implementation of the compensation study. Chair Corran believed that some things will be implemented this fiscal year and definitely more things next year. Ms. Stark reminded the Board that the veterinary position was posted in 2021 and really wants a veterinarian to be recruited at a competitive rate. She asked about the list of veterinarians that had been provided to Clint Thacker and if anything has been done about it. She asked for clarification regarding the microchip information for community cats. She does not like that the cats she is taking care of are chipped to the shelter and requested that a consistent rule be created to apply to all the community cats.

Cheryl Haine, Member of the Public is in the process of creating a nonprofit organization called Animal Spaces. The mission is to keep animals out of the shelter. She transports animals to Delaware, Missouri, Ohio, and other places. She attended a partial tour of the new shelter and feels that the new shelter is beautiful. She wished to see the animals from the old building and was told that if the staff had time they would bring an animal down. Ms. Haine was told there was not enough staff to clean the old building in time for a tour. She went back later and it took two hours to see eight dogs. She felt that she should be allowed to walk through the building and see all the dogs much faster. She did not understand why a staff member should be needed to attend a visitor the whole time. She discussed a dog that did not do well at the shelter and indicated that the shelter should be open to the public so people can see what is going on and see all the animals to increase their adoption chances.

Renee Chavez, Member of the Public is a community advocate for animals. She is raising her grandchildren and training them to be shelter volunteers. She was concerned that fosters are not allowed to adopt their foster animals. She felt that the fosters should have the first right to adopt their fosters and that this should be included in the handbook. She also suggested adding another foster coordinator or making the current one more accessible. She would like to schedule meetings with Clint Thacker later regarding her concerns.

Bridget Burris, Member of the Public asked about what the Board plans to do to get to a no-kill status. She reminded the Board that the population of Las Cruces is growing, not shrinking. She visited the Espanola shelter and saw that their animals have veterinary care 12 days of every week, while Las Cruces only has five days. She was very concerned about getting veterinarians on staff and increasing spay and neuter activities to help reduce euthanasia rates.

 Member of the Public commented that the bureaucracy involved in getting help with spaying and neutering animals reduces the number of people who will bother to get their animals altered. She suggested a simpler program for low- and middle-income people to use. Local veterinarians are overwhelmed and it takes three to six weeks to get their animal in to have it altered. She suggested a flat rate for animals to be neutered.

 MaryAnn Costa, Member of the Public commented that the town she moved here from took ten years to finally succeed at becoming no-kill. She has rescued several pets and kept them. She applauded fosters for doing the hard work. She suggested that the old building be used partly for medical and partly for overflow intake animals rather than entirely medical. She suggested subcontracting general cleaning services until the new budget and compensation are implemented. She felt that it is difficult to choose a pet from a photo book and this reduces adoptions and that the animals should all be available for viewing.

Janine Trujillo, Member of the Public visited the shelter and walked through the maze of kennels, as the puppy she was interested in was with its foster and unavailable to meet. She saw a very thin dog and adopted it. With proper veterinary care, he is now healthy and a great pet. She wanted people to be able to see those overlooked pets.

Vanessa Chastain, Foster Coordinator at ASCMV reported that the foster handbook indicates a foster may adopt their animal if they have fostered at least three months. The foster has to do the same process as anyone else. When the rescues choose those animals, the fosters realize that they do not want to give it up and so ASCMV asks the rescues if the foster may keep the animal. If the rescue has committed the animal to someone else, the foster will not be allowed to adopt it. ASCMV is working on a way to give the fosters more opportunities to adopt and if they do not want to adopt, they will sign a rescue agreement. Ms. Chastain is available to meet by appointment. She believes that increasing the number of

1 animals in foster care will increase the live release rate and so is constantly 2 working to find more foster homes. 3 4 Clint Thacker discussed the community cats microchip information. All a caretaker 5 has to do is ask the information to be changed when the animal comes into the 6 He commented that most people do not want their shelter for neutering. 7 information connected to those cats. He commented that there is a full-time 8 veterinarian on staff. She is the Medical Director of the shelter and surgeries 9 happen almost every weekday, including some weekends when there are contracted veterinarians doing surgeries. When every single staff member comes 10 to work, the shelter meets the minimum standard of care with the cleaning. Almost 11 every day, at least one person calls in sick. Therefore, the staff who do show up 12 13 have to do all the cleaning and it is generally not finished by noon, when the shelter 14 opens for adoption. He reported that only in the last few months of operation of the old building and only in a few areas were the kennels open to the public. The 15 16 shelter is currently in the process of bringing in more people to keep things up. 17 18 Chair Corran thanked the volunteers and their Coordinator for all their help in trying 19 to solve problems at the shelter. 20 9. **CHAIR AND BOARD COMMENTS:** 21 22 23 Marylou Ward commented that neutering animals is very important because they 24 are less likely to roam around and be picked up by ACOs. She commented that 25 the Dona Ana County partnership with SNAP has helped neuter 386 animals since 26 June 2023. They have also provided rabies vaccinations for 246 animals and microchips for 116. She commented that Mr. Macias is working to help get a 27 veterinarian to go out in the rural areas to do neutering and there is an interview 28 29 scheduled for tomorrow. 30 31 Fernando Macias commented that the County is trying to start a pilot project to 32 have a veterinarian do mobile neuter surgeries, possibly starting in the south 33 county area. He hopes to do enough surgeries to have a noticeable decrease in 34 number of strays picked up. If the pilot project worked out, the County would hope 35 to get others to do mobile surgeries routinely. 36 37 10. Financial Report for January 31, 2024 - Unaudited

Attached are the unaudited financial results of the Animal Service Center operations for the period ended January 31, 2024. Some observations for your consideration:

- The Statement of Net Position (page 1) reported cash of \$1,241,598 in the General Fund. Total assets were \$1,241,598. Accrued payroll liabilities ended at \$115,986. Total liabilities were \$329,760. The unassigned fund balance was \$911,838.
- The Statement of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balance Budget and Actual (page 2) showed YTD operating revenues in the General Fund at \$2,867,405 which is 61.5% of budget. YTD operating expenditures were \$2,176,082 which is 45.9% of budget. The operating income for the period was \$691,323.
- Operating revenues were at 61.5% of budget due to the first contributions from the City and the County as stated in the JPA. Revenues that did not meet the budget target of 58.3% included vaccinations, pet micro-chip, return to owner-DAC, return to owner-CLC, spay/neuter, City of Anthony, donations & memorials, grant revenue and animal shelter services.
- All expenditures were below the 58.3% budget parameter except insurance which was at 95.9% due to the pre-payment of insurance premiums.
