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court hold animals with two animals currently in the facility which will be released soon. There were no rabies submissions. There were 36 diverted intakes. There were 462 education, probably more since they participated at the Fair and did education/outreach but did not count them. Mr. Hulsey visited some middle schools and did a presentation on snake identification and avoidance and provided materials for the schools to distribute at the elementary schools on the subject. The total calls was 775 for September 2023. The breakdown per district: District 1 had zero cats and six dogs; District 2 had 31 cats and eight dogs; District 3 had six cats and 29 dogs; District 4 had 14 cats and 23 dogs; District 5 was very busy this month, probably due to the ACES project there, had 26 cats and 34 dogs; District 6 had no cats and 18 dogs; District 7 had 11 cats and 39 dogs which was about normal for them. Monthly comparison for stray cats and dogs graphs were shown. Districts 7 and 5 were the hot spots in September. Reasons for owner release: Two dogs were unable to be kept on the property and owners did not want to get citations; four were from owners who could not take care of them; one was aggressive; two were from owners who were unable to control them; two were sick/injured; and one owner was moving out of state and did not want to take the dog.

Gino Jimenez reported the City's numbers for September 2023. There were 538 stray calls; 229 gone on arrival; 309 apprehended; 250 were impounded at ASCMV; 158 were dogs and 92 were cats. Successful field RTO 59 animals and 29 were unsuccessful attempts to RTO. These animals had some sort of identification but ACOs were unable to get some of them back to their owners. This made a total of 88 identifiable animals. Three-year stray call comparison shows 4,605 reported stary animals for the year. The Peak Performance report shows that this month City ACOs fell a bit short of their goal of 65% minimum secured animals with a total of Three-year field RTO comparison shows a grand total of 417 successful for the year. The Peak Performance goal is 25% of all strays captured; this month ACOs achieved 14.5%. The community cat program totals: ACOs responded to 65 cats in traps with 13 already marked. This brings numbers up to 591 trap calls and 109 community cats released. This makes roughly 18% of the cats in traps being released. Reasons for owner surrendering animals: Five puppies owners were unable to care for; five dogs owners were unable to care for; five dogs with parvo; four dogs with health issues; four dogs kept escaping/owners could not keep in the yard; three dogs for dangerous dog admission; three cats for new location does not allow animals; three dogs for aggression; two dogs for new place not allowing pets; two dogs for too many animals; one dog killed another family pet. Reasons unable to field RTO: 23 had no contact by phone or at the residence; three owners were out of town; two chips were not registered; one chip was not updated; the previous owner was in El Paso and the new owner was unknown. Peak Performance measures not previously discussed: 10% reduction of stray animal bite responses was not met, as

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there was a 22.8% increase in stray animal bites from September 2022 to September 2023; 10% reduction in owner victim bites was also not met, with 10.8% increase with 77 so far for 2023 when there were 66 in 2022. Total calls for the month are 1,141 bringing the year total to 10,640. All the ACOs are now NACA (National Animal Care & Control Association) I and II certified. Gino Jimenez managed to obtain scholarships through Animal Protection of New Mexico and every one of them used those scholarships to get their training. They participated in a total of 175 hours of training as a result, with some of the City-required training as well. Each NACA level has at least 12 topics and some subjects include things like cock/dog fighting, care and maintenance, shelter maintenance, impounding, animal identification, exotic animals, investigations, photographing crime scenes, and many more. Councilor Gandara requested a presentation to explain the training in more depth at next month's meeting.

Board Member Ward reported that with the County's ACES project, the ACES stands for Animal Control and Code Enforcement Environmental Survey, and those projects are going strong. These projects are in conjunction with cleanup days where the County goes into rural areas and provides roll-off trash removal bins and other resources to help constituents to keep their properties clean. Since the beginning of these "Clean Up with Carlos" days the County has picked up 53,200 pounds of trash and 38,200 pounds of tires. The funding for these projects comes from the El Camino Real partnership rather than the General Fund.

Gino Jimenez reported that the majority of calls come through Central Dispatch with some citizens calling the office directly, and the third origin of calls would be self-initiated calls when the officer sees a violation and starts his/her own card for it. The least number of calls originate with Gino Jimenez when a citizen contacts him, receives an explanation of the Animal Control process, and if the person still wants to speak to an officer a call will be created. Central Dispatch is manned 24/7 and Gino Jimenez does not know how many people actually work there. MVRDA presented to the Board in March or April and gave details. Board Member Flores was concerned that she should know about MVRDA. Leeann DeMouche expects that at the next budget cycle there will be a work session where MVRDA Executive Director Hugo Costa, Jr. will come and present again.

Four ACOs have attended training in Albuquerque for the link between domestic violence and animal abuse in September 2023. There are minimal cruelty calls in Las Cruces, with only about 46 during September. The priority of the responding ACO is the animal issue. If the officer notices something that looks like domestic abuse, the matter will be referred to the appropriate agency. The majority of the animal abuse calls in September were for animals left in cars while the owners were at the store. The rest of the calls were more related to care and maintenance than cruelty and so

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were not titled correctly. Gino Jimenez thinks that perhaps MVRDA should be the ones who can track the connection, as they would have taken the initial call and also been able to track that case as it was transferred to other agencies. Brian Hulsey reported that in his experience, a felony animal cruelty case would be split in half so that both the Sheriff's Department and Animal Control could track their relevant parts, and then if the call turns out to be mislabeled then the tracking can be revised. The splitting of the calls is also tracked at MVRDA as well as the relevant agencies. The tracking and reporting is likely not catching all of the correct data and a task force probably needs to be created to examine it. A suggestion was made to include a companion animal component to domestic violence interventions. Gino Jimenez suggested that more thorough training for ACOs might help them to more readily recognize domestic abuse and animal abuse.

Shelter Statistics/Activities: Clint Thacker reported the September 2023 numbers. Population at the Center is currently 486 with 397 dogs and 89 cats. Intake was 875 animals with 564 dogs and 304 cats. Comparison shows a steady rise in intake. Intake methods: ACOs 57.5% with strays by the public the next highest and owner surrender 11.5%. There were 16 total returns after adoptions. ASCMV continues to try to help people keep their pets with food and veterinary care whenever possible. Diverted were 151 people agreeing to hold the animal until an alternative home is found. Outcomes: Many animals euthanized in September 2023; adoptions and reclaims were lower than this time last year, rescues was a lower percentage due to the higher number of animals coming in. September transfers were 123 to the rescue groups. Mr. Thacker tried to get Elizabeth Seely to come be recognized for her hard work, but she refused. Mr. Thacker reports that the rescue coordinators at ASCMV are doing an awesome job and thanks Liz, Amy, and Kim for their work. Euthanasia reasons in September include space/medical for dogs since there is nowhere to hospitalize them; when the new facility is open, some of these animals will be kept and healed, but Mr. Thacker reports that staffing will continue to be an issue and hopes to receive help from volunteers to allow for the people to be available to care for hospitalized animals. The surgery team is doing an amazing job with 362 surgeries. The majority of the surgeries were TNRs. Volunteers gave a total of 603 hours. Some of the volunteers attended the information booths at various festivals. Maddie's Fund will evaluate the ASCMV volunteer program, so there will be questionnaires for volunteers to fill out. The questions have been vetted and includes questions like, "What would you like to see changed in the volunteer program at ASCMV?" or "How can we improve the program?" Mr. Thacker hopes for good information from this so the program can grow. Visitors were down a bit at 1,400. Website views are down to 32,900. Facebook views went down a little bit since Sir Henry did not have another birthday; however, the numbers show a steady, slow increase since November of 2022. There was a training last Monday by the City on how

to properly use social media and make it more ADA compliant that was very well attended. There is a program that reads the website for the visitor but it does not do well with images, so another program has to be used for the images. Upcoming events include adoptions at Firehouse 1 on November 4, 2023; attending the Community Resource Fair at NMSU on November 15, 2023; November 8th is National Adoption Week; and November 18th will be an event at the Icebox Brewery. Yoli and the Volunteer Department are amazing. Milo, the cat of the week, was adopted guickly. Mookie is still waiting for adoption.

The owner surrender data in the Director's report includes the data from the Currently ASCMV is doing a compensation study to ACO reports. determine appropriate salaries and the Budget Analyst and Operations Director are working to see which jobs can be shared and switched around. Mr. Thacker could look into getting a staffing study started to help determine how many new staff need to be brought in. The main challenge for ASCMV is turnover. The positions are available, but it is difficult to keep them filled. There is a new staffing specialist coming on soon. HR Department is currently extremely busy and it slows things down if everything is not complete when it is submitted, and the new specialist can make sure that packets are complete. The specialist can also work on making appointments for tours and other things. Board Member Corran asked Mr. Thacker to have all the staffing needs available for the next budget meetings. Mr. Thacker has submitted a Request for Completion Date for the second week of November in hopes that the new facility can be opened on November 18, 2023. All the cement has been poured and now they are only waiting on the landscaping and rock to be laid down. The fencing is not quite done, but that can be done after moving in. Leeann DeMouche reports that trainings, meetings, and questionnaires about staffing questions and budgeting information will be starting in November. Her people will be doing each department individually with revenue forecasting in preparation for the February budget retreat. Mr. Thacker reported that when requesting more staff positions, he would fill out various forms and have discussions with his HR representative, Loyola, and then the forms are submitted. The process is slow.

5.4 **Committee Reports**

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Finance - Leeann Demouche, Director of Finance: Veronica Ulloa reported the unaudited September financial statements. Cash was There were no receivables. Liabilities were \$203,171. Revenues collected in advance were \$217,686. Unassigned fund balance was 952,348 and total liabilities and fund balance was \$1,373,205. Change in net position: Total revenues were \$1,559,240 and total expenditures were \$827,403. Budget to actual and change in net position: Total revenue \$1,559,240 and budget parameter is at 25%, total budget is at 33.4%. Total

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expenditures \$827,403, 17.4% of the budget. Net change is \$731,837. Revenues and expenditures: Revenues decreased due to the City and County's contributions to 36.2%. Services decreased slightly due to the nature of the expenditures. Year to date expenditures were \$827,403; 59% of that was salary, benefits were 20%, services were 10%, supplies were 7%, other was 1%, and insurance was 2%. All the other items were at 0. Photos of the pets of the Accounting Department were shown.

Executive - Manuel Sanchez, Committee Chair: Councilor Gandara reported that the agenda was discussed at the meeting along with the 501(c)(3) and the JPA approval. Mr. Thacker reported that he will be attending Commission and Council meetings whenever there is an animal topic.

Facilities - Kasandra Gandara, Committee Chair: Board Member Schaljo-Hernandez reported that the Facilities Committee met on October 5, 2023 and got a wonderful tour of the new facility. The pads had been poured in the meet-n-greet area and the poles were being installed, the puppy cages were in and the new trim is currently being installed. The wires for the wireless routers have been installed but the hardware is on backorder. Cat kennels are under production and will be arriving the week of November 6, 2023. The company will charge \$30,000 if Mr. Thacker wants to purchase 24 cage walls, but he was not sure if he actually wanted to do that. Facilities is waiting for a PO to be generated to purchase new key cards that might work at both buildings. All the cameras except in the kennel rooms are running. The dishwashers have arrived. They must be installed by a licensed electrician and licensed plumber to keep the warranty, so the quotes have been submitted. The commercial dishwashers use much hotter water than home machines, so special pipes and other parts must be used that are more heat-resistant. Once the parts arrive, the machines will be installed.

6. **DISCUSSION ITEMS:**

6.1 Overview of 501(c)(3): Clint Thacker and Benjamin Young of Mynatt Springer, ASCMV Attorney discussed the 501(c)(3) designation. In May, Kelly Barker asked Mr. Thacker if he would like to take over the Humane Society of Southern New Mexico's designation when they disbanded, and if so she would communicate with Frank Bryce, the Director of HSSNM. Mr. Bryce agreed to allow it. Mr. Thacker wants to honor HSSNM for all their hard work. On May 31, 2023 Ms. Barker reported that the Board had already resigned and only Mr. Bryce was left. This made things more difficult legally, but Attorney Young worked hard to get a resolution made so that the situation would be fine, then got in touch with their accountant to make sure everything was in good standing, and it was. Therefore, on September 11, 2023 the resolution was sent to Mr. Bryce and he signed

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and returned it on September 28, 2023. Mr. Thacker looked up "animal industry grants with 501(c)(3)" and found a huge amount of information on grants the shelter could go after if they had a 501(c)(3). Board Member Corran is concerned about this situation, as she is aware that Mr. Bryce has had dementia for a while, so the agreement may be called into question. She also reported that Kelly Barker has a questionable history with the County that included a large amount of misinformation and ended very badly, so she was concerned about working with Ms. Barker.

Board Member Corran was also concerned that every member of the HSSNM Board had already resigned before this resolution was created. She also had questions about this 501(c)(3) being separate from a "friends of" organization and would want buy-in from an existing community organization's board. Mr. Thacker was unaware that Mr. Bryce has dementia and is uncertain how to confirm that, considering HIPAA laws. Board Member Corran reported that she has heard it from many people in the animal community that she has no reason to doubt, and has personal knowledge of Ms. Barker's unethical behavior. Mr. Thacker reported that Ms. Barker has stated she does not want to be involved in any board or organization coming from this, she was just trying to help out as a friend. Councilor Flores agreed with Councilor Corran and reiterated that ASCMV should have nothing to do with Kelly Barker. HSSNM already cleared out their account, which had \$511 in it, and gave that money to ASCMV. Board Member Schaljo-Hernandez suggested that the discussion cover two topics: What mechanism this is and how it is being used, versus his preferred idea of having the ASCMV obtain its own 501(c)(3) rather than taking over someone else's. Councilor Flores agrees that ASCMV should seek its own 501(c)(3). The check for \$511 is currently in the Center's safe and Mr. Thacker is unsure of the intent for it, whether it was intended to be starting money for the 501(c)(3) or just a donation. Councilor Flores reiterated that ASCMV should have absolutely no association with Ms. Barker and recommended sending the check back if she had anything to do with it. Leeann DeMouche confirmed that the check is made out to ASCMV and offered to research what it is intended for. She believes the check is simply the result of the account being closed out and the proceeds sent to ASCMV and so the money probably will not have anywhere to go if the check is returned. Clint Thacker offered to find out from the originating credit union to find out what happened. Vice-Chair Gandara agreed that he should.

Attorney Benjamin Young will contact HSSNM's accountants to find out what is going on with the \$511 check. The only part of the process of taking on the 501(c)(3) that has been completed is the resolution authorizing ASCMV to work with the accountant on the project. The point of giving the 501(c)(3) to ASCMV would have been to transfer existing contacts that HSSNM has had historically, giving the ASCMV a leg up in the grant

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applications and such. Attorney Young was unaware of Mr. Bryce's dementia but admitted that if he was incapacitated when he signed the resolution in September that the issue would need to be revisited. It is unclear which of the options regarding the "friends of" organization the Board is interested in pursuing. One option would be to make it a subcommittee of the ASCMV which would gather funds and then bring it to the Board for decisions on how to use those funds. Another would be to use the existing 501(c)(3) and tweak its mission. A third option would be to establish a new 501(c)(3) tasked with obtaining funds and connections independently to benefit the ASCMV. Having a "friend of" or foundation 501(c)(3) independent of the ASCMV would allow them to create connections with entities that have no strings attached and can give all the money to 501(c)(3) foundations that they wish, and be able to make all the charitable deductions. This is not always available to government entities. Some grants are not eligible for the charitable deduction if they are given to a government entity. This gives a much broader field of opportunity to obtain grants. The difficulty with this is that it has a completely separate, independent board with its own structure, and Attorney Young strongly recommended that it would have its own attorney, CPA, and everything. It would still exist exclusively for the benefit of the ASCMV. It has been known for this type of relationship to turn sour. With the option of having a subcommittee situation, it would be easier to set up and the Board would have complete control of the subcommittee's activities. The drawback is that the resources would be limited. Many of the grants would exclude a subcommittee of a government entity. Board Member Schaljo-Hernandez mentioned that there are already a large number of 501(c)(3) organizations in the area that benefit animals and the ASCMV. He wanted to see a layout of what Mr. Thacker wanted from this 501(c)(3), whether he preferred the independent foundation option or the subcommittee option, and how this would work. He was concerned that funding an independent board would put too much burden on the Board and Mr. Thacker. Leeann DeMouche reported that in the case of the Friends of the Library, they go out and find money to buy books and volunteer their time to help the library, but the City has no monitoring or directing type of connection. Library personnel may attend the Friends of the Library meetings and let them know what they need, but otherwise it is completely independent. Attorney Young reported that the connection between the ASCMV and a "friends of" group would be defined by the group's bylaws. He mentioned that the Board should designate an ex-officio member to that group to advise their board of ASCMV's needs, but without any voting rights or control. Board Member Schaljo-Hernandez did not feel that a "friends of" organization should definitely not fund staffing or operating costs. There is a grant writer position at the ASCMV and the money obtained from her efforts has been used to great effect. If a subcommittee was formed, the grant writer would have oversight and the subcommittee would possibly be tasked with community networking to find access to local things that a single person would have

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problems finding. It seems as if this would create duplication of tasks and activities, as the grant writer and the subcommittee would be doing the same things. Having a "friends of" would allow the ASCMV to request that they pursue a grant which the Center could then use. Mr. Thacker was attracted to the HSSNM 501(c)(3) because it is already established, where he had tried to get people interested in starting a new one over the past several years and no one was interested because they were too busy to start one and get all the connections from scratch. Board Member Corran was adamant that the ASCMV not take over an existing 501(c)(3). She also felt that this would be seen as an attempt to skirt the Anti-Donation Clause and there would be too many legal grey areas. Councilor Flores was concerned that it is not within the Board's purview to be intertwined with a 501(c)(3) and wondered where the money would fit into the budget. She was also concerned that a government entity would not have the autonomy to start a 501(c)(3). The ASCMV exists due to a JPA between the City Government and the County Government and may not be compatible with a 501(c)(3). Mr. Thacker reported that the ASCMV is allowed to do anything any other governmental agency is allowed to do by statute. The grant writer, Elaine, is now a contractor rather than an employee. Vice-Chair Gandara summarized the discussion thus: "No" to the HSSNM 501(c)(3) due to Board Members' concerns. The question has become whether the Board wants to move in the direction of having a "friends of" and what will the Board direct Mr. Thacker to do about it. Councilor Flores wanted to have advice from an attorney who knows if the JPA status will allow a 501(c)(3) association and how that would impact the Board. Vice-Chair Gandara would like to explore the idea and have more research done by Mr. Thacker, the ASCMV attorneys, and the City's attorney as to whether it would be able to exist and how it would work.

Gerry, Member of the Public, asked if community members could establish a 501(c)(3) for the benefit of the shelter that had nothing to do with the City. Clint Thacker indicated that there would still be no control over any funds and that would be considered a donation. Leeann DeMouche indicated that she should ask the City Attorney, Tax Attorney, and County Attorney how that would work. She stated that the bylaws and controls would have to be very carefully written and controlled to prevent a repeat of the last situation that was very unpleasant. Gerry offered to help in any capacity she can.

Tina Dalcour, Member of the Public, reported that she is dissolving her business and was hoping to start a nonprofit with that money to help spay female cats and dogs. She would then donate all that money to the ASCMV.

November and December meeting Dates: Mr. Thacker reported that the next regular Board meeting date falls on Thanksgiving Day. He asked the Board to help decide on a date. Vice-Chair Gandara indicated that deciding on a date depends on whether the City chambers are available. The

Financial Report for October 31, 2023 - Unaudited

Attached are the unaudited financial results of the Animal Service Center operations for the period ended October 31, 2023. Some observations for your consideration:

- The Statement of Net Position (page 1) reported cash of \$1,425,771 in the General Fund. Total assets were \$1,431,021. Accrued payroll liabilities ended at \$115,987. Total liabilities were \$424,117. The unassigned fund balance was \$1,006,904.
- The Statement of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balance Budget and Actual (page 2) showed YTD operating revenues in the General Fund at \$1,896,169 which is 40.7% of budget. YTD operating expenditures were \$1,109,780 which is 23.4% of budget. The operating income for the period was \$786,389.
- Operating revenues were at 40.7% of budget due to the first contributions from the City and the County as stated in the JPA. Revenues that did not meet the budget target of 33.3% included vaccinations, pet micro-chip, return to owner-DAC, return to owner-CLC, spay/neuter, donations & memorial and Animal Shelter Services.
- Due to annual renewal, insurance was at 37.5% of budget. All other expenditures were below the 33.3% budget parameter.
- The Grants and Donations Schedule, page 8, provides a summary of grants and donations received.
